CALL TO ORDER

Chair Nelson called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

APPROVAL OF THE FEBRUARY 19, 2020 TAC MINUTES

Klockeman moved to approve the February 19, 2020 TAC minutes. Baxter seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

CONSENT AGENDA

Multimodal Options Fund (MMOF) Call for Projects – Schneiders moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Anderson seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

ACTION ITEMS

March 2020 TIP Amendment – Bornhoft explained the TIP Amendments submitted to the NFRMPO, including revising the funding for the *North I-25: Design Build* project to reduce State funding by \$6.97M and change funding programs for other State funds; removing the *US287 and US34 VMS Signs* project and returning the \$497K to the CMAQ pool; and adding the 13 MMOF projects scheduled to be approved by Planning Council in April. Bornhoft requested recipients of MMOF contact her if there are any issues with their funding in the TIP Amendment. An Environmental Justice (EJ) Analysis was completed and was included in the TAC packet. The public comment period opened March 11, 2020, and no comments have been received to date. Baxter asked where the returned CMAQ funding would go. Bornhoft explained NFRMPO staff will consider other eligible projects from the relevant Call for Projects and bring a recommendation to TAC for discussion once the funds have been returned. Klockeman moved to approve the TIP Amendment. Buckman seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS

Northern Colorado Mobility Study – Keith Wakefield, CDOT Region 4, explained the *Northern Colorado Regional Mobility Plan*. The *Plan* began under the previous Region 4 Transportation Director, who proposed devolving US287 from Longmont to Fort Collins. CDOT staff wanted to work with the Northern Integrated Supply Project (NISP), which will require US287 to be moved north of Laporte. The NISP project has funding to relocate US287, but CDOT wanted to do a wholesale review of alternatives considering the full road system. The *Northern Colorado Regional Mobility Plan* focused on Owl Canyon Road, one of a few east-west corridors north of Fort Collins, to identify potential projects and determine the feasibility of transportation improvements. Larimer County is improving Owl Canyon Road, which has led to an increase in average daily traffic (ADT). CDOT staff considered existing US287 traffic patterns, crash data, and used the NFRMPO's Regional Travel Demand Model. Data from Streetlight showed a split traffic flow, where the majority of passenger vehicles traveled to Fort Collins, while trucks traveled to I-25.

CDOT staff considered four alternatives: no change; a reroute of US287; Alignment F, which is the NISP Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) Preferred Alternative; and the Modified J alignment. Wakefield explained the routes using maps included in his presentation. The alternatives were considered based on potential devolution of US287 in the future. Wakefield stated Alignment F is CDOT's chosen alternative, because there was not much savings using Alignment J. The "no change" alternative was not feasible.

Mallette asked about funding for Glade Reservoir and how it impacts this project. Wakefield said funding for relocating US287 is from the Northern Water Conservancy District, so CDOT wanted to consider whether it could use those funds for a different alternative. CDOT ultimately decided to proceed with the NISP EIS Preferred Alternative. Klockeman asked what the next steps are. Wakefield explained there are no funds or plans to move forward with US287 devolution. Based on this study, CDOT found it was not feasible to move forward with US287 devolution.

North I-25 Project Update – Corey Stewart, CDOT Region 4, stated there was originally only enough funding to complete the interim solution on I-25 Segments 7 and 8, but additional funds in 2019 allowed CDOT to move forward with the permanent Final EIS (FEIS) alignment. CDOT is going through the change order process to modify the existing construction contract. These modifications include additional interchanges, bridge replacements, and pavement reconstruction. The new funding will address construction and program costs. The Executive Management Team wanted a competitive project, which means they will do an Integrated Construction Contract (ICC). The ICC will allow them to bid out parts or all of the project, and have these new projects be handled as by subcontractors to the Primary Contractor. Stewart reported the contract and process

had been approved by FHWA. The new scope elements include the first phase of the US 34 interchange, six I-25 bridge replacements, five overpass bridge replacements, three railroad bridge replacements, eight additional miles of full depth pavement reconstruction, and the relocation of the Port of Entry. The SH14 interchange and US34 full build are not included in the ICC. Stewart said there will be closures on LCR20/East Frontage Road, GWRR, US34, UPRR, Prospect, and West Frontage Road at LCR 30 within the next year. A Communications Plan will be drafted as these projects come up. Klockeman asked if West Frontage Road at LCR30 will open in the next few days. Stewart said it will be open within the next two weeks.

DISCUSSION

NFRMPO Vision Zero Policy Discussion – Karasko introduced the Vision Zero Policy discussion from the January 2020 Planning Council meeting. Planning Council members discussed the idea of an MPO policy which would go beyond the federal requirements. NFRMPO staff presented the federally required Safety Performance Measures. Cunningham presented an analysis of geocoded crashes between 2014 and 2018 within the NFRMPO region. Cunningham noted trends between the NFRMPO region and Colorado overall have been consistent. Karasko asked if TAC was interested in pursuing a regional Vision Zero Policy. Baxter supported the idea but did not know how the MPO would implement the policy. Karasko suggested it could be incorporated into the TIP and Call for Projects. Baxter stated tracking progress toward a Vision Zero Policy would be good and asked to clarify where the crash data came from. Cunningham responded the data is from CDOT, but NFRMPO staff geocoded it. Cunningham is hopeful to get 2019 data soon.

Mallette stated the Planning Council was more interested in creating a local goal and clarifying the region is not comfortable with the number of crashes occurring. The Vision Zero Policy should address both issues, as well as what the NFRMPO has the ability to control. Baxter said it could encourage partnerships between communities. Staff will bring back an outline and example policies at the next TAC meeting.

OUTSIDE PARTNERS REPORTS

NoCo Bike & Ped Collaborative – Written report was provided.

ROUNDTABLE

Karasko stated Transportation Commission is studying the expansion of Bustang, and Commissioner Bracke asked for the regional priorities for expansion. TAC will discuss these suggestions in April. Karasko noted NFRMPO staff will be working remotely starting March 19, 2020 and to email staff if needed.



Key Points

Periodically, unprogrammed funds are identified and additional allocations are awarded to projects selected in previous Calls for Projects held by the NFRMPO. The process for allocating additional funding is identified in the TIP narrative and is based on the project ranking assigned during the scoring process.

The CDOT Region 4 reconciliation from March 23, 2020 identifies \$1,414,951 in unprogrammed FY20 STBG funding, with the vast majority (98 percent) of those funds rolled forward from FY19.

Because the amount of non-rolled FY20 funding is so low, staff proposes allocating all funding to projects from the FY2016-2019 Call for Projects instead of providing 2 percent to the FY2020-2021 Call for Projects. The attachment identifies the recommended award amounts which were developed and agreed to by project sponsors of projects eligible to receive additional funding.

Committee Discussion

The process for awarding the FY19 & FY20 unprogrammed funds was discussed at the June 19, 2019 TAC meeting. Specifically, since unprogrammed FY19 funding had not been awarded due to delays in finalizing available funding and FY19 was the last year of the FY2016-2019 Call for Projects, TAC discussed whether the next allocation should distinguish between rolled funds and non-rolled funds so that rolled funds could be awarded to eligible projects from the FY2016-2019 Call. If not, all funds would be considered FY20 funds and allocated to eligible projects from the FY2020-2021 Call. TAC members supported distinguishing between rolled and non-rolled funds to provide eligible projects from both Calls with additional funding.

Supporting Information

Projects eligible to receive additional funding include partially funded STP-Metro projects from the FY2016-2019 Call and partially funded STBG projects from the FY2020-2021 Call that are not yet completed.

Staff contacted sponsors of eligible projects on April 2nd requesting their preferred allocation amount and the maximum amount of funding their project could accept. The attachment reflects information received from project sponsors as of April 7th.

The FY2016-2019 Call for Projects STP-Metro additional award process: Additional funding is split between the small and large community pools (71.5 percent for large communities, 28.5 percent for small communities) and the funding is assigned to the next highest ranked, partially-funded project in each respective pool. If the next partially funded project in either pot is not ready in the fiscal year funds become available, the money will be assigned to the next partially-funded project in the other community pool. Funds must be backfilled in the large or small pool as needed when they become available. Source: FY19-22 TIP

The FY2020-2021 Call for Projects STBG additional award process: Additional funding will be split between the three partially funded large community projects. Source: FY20-23 TIP

Supporting Information, Continued

Unprogrammed CMAQ funds are also identified in the CDOT Region 4 reconciliation from March 23, 2020, but due to several uncertainties with funded projects and future year planning estimates, CDOT and the NFRMPO agreed to hold off on awarding any unprogrammed CMAQ funds until the available funding is definitive.

Advantages

Approval will ensure available funds are assigned to projects in a timely manner.

Disadvantages

None noted.

Analysis/Recommendation

Staff recommends allocating the partially funded STP-Metro projects from the FY2016-2019 Call with the funding amounts specified in the attachment.





Background

The NFRMPO staff has drafted the Tasks and Products for FY2021 the *FY2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)*. The Finance Committee will review the FY2021 Budget on April 15 and it is anticipated they will recommend Planning Council approval at the June 4, 2020 meeting. The FY2020-2021 UPWP and FY2021 Budget will go to Planning Council for their approval at their June 5, 2019 meeting to allow CDOT and FHWA approval prior to October 1, 2020.

The new or modified FY2021 UPWP Tasks, which were not included in the FY2020-2021 UPWP when it was adopted on June 6, 2019, are:

- Task 2.8: 2020 Household Survey
- Task 2.11: Greeley Multimodal Transportation Plan
- Task 4.4: Mobility Management
- Task 4.6: One Call/One Click

These Tasks are also attached to this Memo. The updated draft FY2021 local match requirements by community will be provided at the meeting. 2.8 2020 HOUSEHOLD SURVEY

OBJECTIVE:

This Work Task allows for the development and completion of the 2020 Household Survey for the 2050 Regional Travel Demand Model (RTDM) and the Statewide model.

METHOD:

NFRMPO staff will work with CDOT, DRCOG, PPACG, PACOG, and GVMPO on the development and completion of the 2020 Statewide Household Survey.

OVERALL IMPACT/INTENT:

This Work Task updates the 2009 Household Survey and will provide new and more up-to-date information on travel patterns within the NFRMPO model area as well as the State as a whole.

2.11 GREELEY MULTIMODAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN

OBJECTIVE:

This Work Task will create a multimodal transportation plan for the City of Greeley, including a Transit Master Plan. The final transportation plan(s) will articulate Greeley's vision and serve as a multimodal roadmap for transportation investments and strategies within the City.

METHOD:

The Multimodal Transportation Plan production process would incorporate input from City departments including Parks and Recreation, Community Development, and Public Works to help gain cross-departmental knowledge and buy-in. Public input will be gathered with open houses, focus groups, pop-up events, surveys and online feedback opportunities. The Multimodal Transportation Plan will include a thorough existing conditions summary of demographic indicators, land use, transportation, environment, economy, existing mode share, policy and plan review, and infrastructure. This information will help reveal improvement opportunity areas and inform anticipated future conditions relating to growth and travel trends. The result would be a concrete set of goals and objectives for the future. From there the plan will analyze future scenarios and identify key projects and triggers for those transportation investments that are in line with the vision of the plan.

OVERALL IMPACT/INTENT:

The Multimodal Transportation Plan will identify key projects and investments needed within the City, including integration of the roadway, transit, and non-motorized systems. This will be undertaken through an extensive outreach effort, creating a well-informed and community-supported Plan.

4.4 MOBILITY MANAGEMENT

OBJECTIVE:

This Work Task ensures a consistent and integrated approach to regional mobility management programs, projects, and strategies outlined in the federally mandated NFRMPO Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan). This program will work in tandem with and support the One Call/One Click Center project.

METHOD:

Staff implements the approved <u>Coordinated Plan's</u> projects and programs through the Larimer County and Weld County Mobility Committees (LCMC and WCMC). The NFRMPO will seek opportunities for additional collaboration between the two committees to improve regional mobility. Staff developed the <u>Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan</u>, adopted in December 2017 and amended in January 2020. Staff conducts outreach in each County through presentations and individual meetings with the goal of providing information regarding Coordinated Plan programs and transit services in the North Front Range area. This includes the implementation of a One Call/One Click Center in Larimer and Weld counties.

Staff participates in committees, conferences, studies, and meetings that relate to mobility management or regional and/or state transit issues. Examples include the Colorado Mobility and Action Coalition (CMAC), CASTA conferences, Mobility and Access Priority Group/Senior Transportation Coalition (STC), and others.

Staff also supports Mobility Committee member agencies through production and distribution of outreach materials and responds to information requests from member governments, other agencies and individuals regarding transit information.

OVERALL IMPACT/INTENT:

The intent of the Mobility Management Program is improvement of transportation services in the North Front Range region for medical, employment, and other destinations particularly for seniors, people with disabilities, veterans, and low-income individuals. This task also helps to coordinate human service-related transportation programs and services between agencies to enhance service and maximize available resources.

4.6 ONE CALL/ONE CLICK CENTER

OBJECTIVE:

This Work Task supports the implementation of the One Call/One Click Center project, coordinating rides for human service, volunteer, and transit agencies in Larimer and Weld counties. This project was identified in the 2017 Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan).

METHOD:

Staff implements this <u>Coordinated Plan</u> project through the purchase of software and the hiring of a dedicated Mobility Manager. The Mobility Manager will meet with stakeholders, including riders, providers, and local government officials; purchase and implement new software; lead projects to market the program; and provide assistance to individuals in need of rides. The NFRMPO will purchase trip discovery software, trip dispatch software, and implement a staff training program to use this new technology.

OVERALL IMPACT/INTENT:

The intent of the One Call/One Click Program is to coordinate transportation services in the North Front Range region for medical, employment, and other destinations particularly for seniors, people with disabilities, veterans, and low-income individuals. This service will connect individuals in need of a ride with the most appropriate and affordable options.

Re: NFRMPO Vision Zero Policy Discussion

Background

At the January 9, 2020 Planning Council meeting, NFRMPO Staff presented the NFRMPO's 2016-2020 Safety Performance Targets. As in previous years, NFRMPO Staff and TAC members recommended the support of the State's targets over the creation of regionally specific targets due to the lack of availability of data in a timely manner. Some Planning Council members felt a policy towards zero deaths should be created over the next year, along with the federally required data driven performance targets.

The initial direction from Planning Council was to look at a policy that would embrace moving towards no fatalities within the region. A Vision Zero Policy, "a strategy to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, equitable mobility for all"¹, is an aspirational goal, while the Federal Safety Performance Measures and Targets must be data driven. The Federal performance measures do not prevent the NFRMPO from having a separate and overarching Vision Zero Policy.

As a part of this process, NFRMPO staff looked at other MPOs around the country to determine what best practices for a Vision Zero Policy were. The Central Lane MPO (CLMPO) in Oregon adopted the *Central Lane Metropolitan Organization Safety Transportation Action Plan* in 2017 with the following statement:

As a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), CLMPO recognizes the importance of meeting the federal requirements of performance-based planning and the role of safety within that model. Furthermore, our region has experienced increasing fatal and sever injuries over the past few years and the MPO and its partner jurisdictions have refocused their efforts on transportation safety. There is a strong desire throughout the region to go beyond fulfillment of federal requirements.²

CLMPO specifies the purpose of the Plan is to "create a regional policy framework that regards traffic crashes as preventable incidents that can be addressed in a systematic way."

Additionally, DRCOG recently published their draft plan *Taking Action on Regional Vision Zero:* Safer Streets for Metro Denver, a guidebook to assist local agencies in developing a vision zero plan. DRCOG states that they "value local adoption and implementation of Vision Zero" and the guidebook provides planning practices and guidelines for strategic safety efforts to eliminate fatal and serious injury crashes in the region. ³

Staff feels an overarching policy for Vision Zero as well as incorporation into the Call for Projects Process would be good first steps for a regional Vision Zero Policy. Staff would like to continue the conversation begun last month with TAC members to discuss the viability of a Vision Zero Policy in the region, the data requirements, the reporting mechanism(s) and how they tie to the Federal Safety Performance Targets.

Action

Staff requests TAC members be prepared to discuss the possibility of the NFRMPO having a Vision Zero Policy and to provide feedback at the May 13, 2020 TAC meeting.

Re: NFRMPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Pipeline of Projects

Background

In October 2019, the Northern Colorado (NoCo) Bike and Pedestrian Collaborative began developing a pipeline of projects on or connecting to the Regional Non-Motorized Corridor (RNMC) Network. The pipeline includes projects expected to happen within in the next 10 years. Each project in the pipeline includes project description, which RNMC it is associated with, which local or state agencies are involved, when the project is likely to be under construction or closed (if it is not a construction phase), estimated project cost, and estimated remaining funding needed. The pipeline will be updated semi-annually. This information helps planning partners:

- Prepare for the NFRMPO Call for Projects and other grant opportunities;
- Ensure the upcoming NFRMPO Regional Non-Motorized Plan update contains the most up-to-date information available;
- Collaborate with neighboring jurisdictions along the same RNMC;
- Identify opportunities and barriers along or connecting to the RNMC;
- Maximize regional investment; and
- Prioritize projects.


NFRMPO staff recently updated the pipeline to reflect NFRMPO Multimodal Options Fund (MMOF) awards, anticipated CDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) awards, and additional new information from local agencies. The projects will be mapped as part of the 2020 Regional Non-Motorized Plan update.

North Front Range Transportation and Air Quality Planning Council April 2, 2020

APPROVAL OF THE MEETING AGENDA

Kirkmeyer **moved** to *APPROVE THE APRIL 2, 2020 MEETING AGENDA*. The motion was **seconded** and **passed** unanimously.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

Karspeck moved to APPROVE THE MARCH 5, 2020 MINUTES. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

CONSENT AGENDA

Multimodal Options Fund (MMOF) Call for Projects Donnelly moved to ADOPT THE 2019 MULTIMODAL OPTIONS FUND (MMOF) CALL FOR PROJECTS. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

ACTION ITEMS

March 2020 TIP Amendment

Medora Bornhoft, Transportation Planner II, briefly reviewed information on the three project requests in the March 2020 TIP Amendment with the Council: Revising funding for the *North I-25 Design Build* project; Removing the *US 287 & US 34 VMS Signs* project, and adding 13 projects from the 2019 MMOF call for projects. She noted the public comment period would end April 9th and Council's approval was contingent on any negative comments through that date.

Melendez moved to APPROVE RESOLUTION 2020-12 APPROVING THE MARCH 2020 AMENDMENT TO THE FY 2020-2023 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP). The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

PRESENTATIONS:

North I-25 Segment 6 Update

Abra Geissler, CDOT Resident Engineer and Project Director for I-25 North: Berthoud to Johnstown, presented the I-25 Segment 6 Project Update to the Council stating the Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) was a very favorable delivery method for this project as it will allow for construction to begin during design. Kirkmeyer asked about the apparent \$13M shortfall in project funds. Geissler explained the evolution of the project's cost and funding noting the final numbers are still subject to change, potentially for the good, due to continually evolving contractor options. She will continue to update the Council on the progress of the project and funding. Weekly updates can be found at: https://www.codot.gov/projects/north-i-25/johnstown-to-fort-collins

US 34/US 85

Dan Mattson, CDOT Resident Engineer, Central Greeley, gave a comprehensive presentation of the US 34/US 85 Interchange Reconfiguration to the Council. Mattson identified the interchange, more commonly known as Spaghetti Junction, needs to become less confusing and be able to handle the higher volume of traffic which has been forecasted. Because funding for the entire project is not available currently, it has been broken-down into six phases with an overall cost estimate of \$170M.

Poudre Express Update

Will Jones, Deputy Director, Greeley Public Works, explained to the Council although the Poudre Express was a relatively new service for the region which began in January, it had been part of Greeley Area Transit's (GET) 2016 Strategic Plan, along with the NFRMPO Regional Transit Element (RTE), and CDOT's Interregional Plan. The Poudre Express is operated by GET with regional funding support from CSU, City of Fort Collins, City of Greeley, Town of Windsor, and CDOT as a Grant Planning Funder. Jones reported the trajectory of ridership was off to a great start, peaking at five riders per hour the second week of March, and just prior to its suspension on March 25th due to COVID-19 restrictions. Generally, a transit program can take approximately 3 years to reach its ridership goal, which in this case is 15 riders per hour, or 80K riders per year. Based on the early numbers (4.78 out of 5 customer rating) and positive feedback from connecting communities, the program is expected to be quite successful.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

NFRMPO Boundary Focus Group

Kirkmeyer reported although COVID-19 has caused CDOT to put the boundary topic on hold temporarily, the scope of work remains as follows:

- Document Colorado Revised Statutes (CRS) pertaining to TPR boundary analysis and revisions
- Examine and define the process for TPR boundary revisions
- Document the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) governing the establishment of an MPO and/or Transportation Management Area (TMA) designation
- Examine and define the process for becoming an MPO and/ or TMA
- Document the CFR requirements for administering an MPO and/or TMA
- Analyze the financial implications of the establishment of a new or revised MPO/ TMA/TPR
- Develop a methodology for boundary modifications based on changes to Census Urbanized Areas
- Develop a methodology for accessing growth patterns along TPR, MPO and/or TMA boundaries

Jamie Grim, CDOT Government Liaison, confirmed the goal was still to have the guidebook completed in June.





New EJ Plan to guide NFRMPO policy

The NFRMPO has undertaken a new Environmental Justice (EJ) Plan, which will help guide the NFRMPO's policy to better include low-income and minority residents.

Through the EJ Plan process, NFRMPO staff expects to implement more equity-based principles into its planning process, improve the public outreach program, and ensure marginalized populations can have a



stronger representation in the transportation planning process. The <u>EJ Plan</u> is expected to be completed by the end of 2020 and act as a guidance document for local and regional agencies.

STC now MAPG

The Senior Transportation Coalition (STC) has changed its name to the Mobility and Access Priority Group (MAPG), to represent its relationship with the Partnership for Age-Friendly Communities (PAFC). While the STC had operated under the guidance of PAFC, the naming convention caused some confusion. In addition, the new MAPG will also expand its focus to include outreach and education for older adults and individuals with disabilities, tying into the work being done for the One Call/One Click Center project.

NADTC grant helps boost Find My Ride

As part of a pilot project for the Every Ride Counts campaign, the National Aging and Disability Transportation Center purchased ads on various media to promote the Find My Ride tool in Northern Colorado. Throughout the pilot, ads were placed on billboards in Fort Collins, Loveland, and Greeley; movie screens; radio stations, including KUNC; social media, like Facebook and Instagram; and on buses within the region. With this effort, average visits to the Find My Ride Tool increased from around 50 in January 2019 to more than 1,000 in January 2020. NFRMPO staff received about 5 calls and Facebook messages as well.

GCI receives new van

The NFRMPO and the Greeley Center for Independence (GCI) applied for and received funding to purchase a wheelchair-accessible vehicle through the FY2019 Consolidated Capital Call for Projects. The van was awarded FTA §5310 funds and is an upgraded Dodge Caravan.

The new van was delivered in February 2020, has space for two wheelchairs with an electronic ramp, and will provide more mobility options for GCI's clients throughout Weld County. The new vehicle has already started providing service, opening up new options for Weld County residents in need.



Multimodal Options Funds Awarded

As part of SB18-001 (SB1), the NFRMPO region received more than \$5 Million in Multimodal Options Funds. Eligible projects were expected to focus on improving mobility for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and providing more safe routes to school. Project types include bicycle and pedestrian projects, transit operating and capital projects, and multimodal studies and technology.

Eight communities in Larimer County and Weld County as well as the NFRMPO applied for and received funding. Transfort received funding for an additional compressed national gas (CNG) as well as funding to do design work for the West Elizabeth Bus Rapid Transit service. The NFRMPO received funding for the One Call/One Click Center and a Premium Transit Analysis. Bicycle and pedestrian projects connected schools and the future Loveland Transit Center to the existing sidewalk and trail network.

MOBILITY COORDINATION





What is the Mobility Coordination Program?— Mobility Coordination program activities are centered on education and cooperative resource-sharing to use existing transportation dollars most efficiently. NFRMPO Examples include travel training, cooperative research, public forums, program implementation, FTA grant administration and public education. The NFRMPO Mobility Coordination Program is funded with Federal Transit Administration (FTA) §5310 funds. Funding has been secured for §5310 funds from both CDOT for Weld County and Fort Collins on behalf of the Fort Collins-Loveland-Berthoud TMA.

Rider's Guide Updates—More than 1,130 users have logged onto the online service to find potential service matches since January 1, 2020, with 99.1 percent of users being new.
