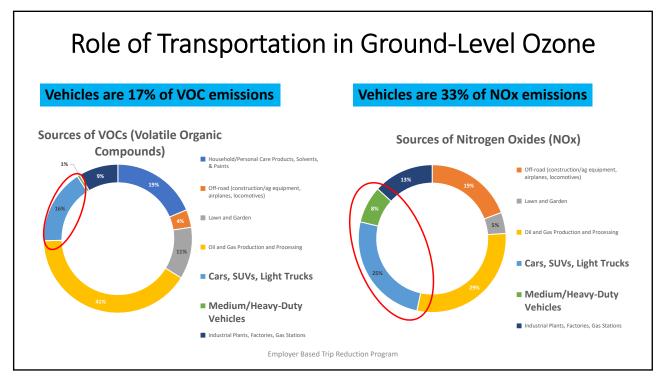

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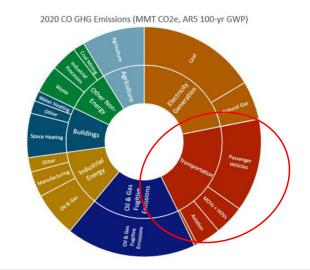
Transportation's Contribution to Colorado's Greenhouse Gas Emissions

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What is an ETRP?

- Various approaches taken by employers to decrease employees' single occupancy vehicle (SOV) commuting trips that reduce ozone causing and climate degrading emissions.
- Encouraged or required by state and local governments around the country.
- Many Front Range organizations and local governments have for many years provided employers resources to take voluntary action.

Why ETRP?

- Our region violates federal ozone standards and needs to reduce greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) over time. We will become "severe" nonattainment in 2022 for the 2008 75 ppb ozone standard.
- Regardless of reclassification to "severe" nonattainment for the 2008 standard, in order for the region to meet its ultimate air quality goal – compliance with the 2015 70 ppb standard – we must be aggressive in our strategies to reduce emissions, including ETRP.
- The RAQC Board has directed the evaluation of numerous voluntary and mandatory approaches to reducing emissions in the ozone nonattainment area, including ETRP.
- The 1990 Clean Air Act originally required ETRPs for severe nonattainment areas. This requirement was softened in the mid-1990's to recommended.

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Statewide Program Under Consideration

- The Air Pollution Control Division (APCD) is developing an approach for reducing vehicle trips across Colorado*, as part of the State's GHG Pollution Reduction Roadmap and a transportation rulemaking to address climate change.
- The State has been looking to the RAQC's robust stakeholder process and draft ETRP framework and intends to propose an ETRP rule for consideration by the Air Quality Control Commission (AQCC) in May 2021, requesting a rulemaking hearing be set for August 2021.
- Over the next few months, as the State engages in regulation development and implementation, the RAQC 's primary roles will be to:
 - Continue efforts with partners to inform the State's process
 - Continue efforts with partners to conduct outreach and education with large employers in the NAA on ETRP and resources available for support

ETRP Elements

(Draft Framework Under Consideration)

- Goal of Program: Improve air quality and reduce GHG emissions through reduced single occupancy vehicle (SOV) trips by commuters.
- Who is Affected: Large employers (threshold TBD)
- Various Program Targets Under Consideration:
 - 10% reduction in employee SOV commuting, beginning in 2022.
 - No more than 75% of employees commuting by SOV, beginning in 2023.
 - This would mean that 1 in 4 employees not drive alone to work on any given work day.
 - No more than 60% of employees commuting by SOV, beginning in 2025.
 - This would mean that employees not drive alone to work twice a week on average.

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ETRP Elements

(Draft Framework Under Consideration)

• <u>Administrative Requirements Under</u> Consideration:

- Development of an employee trip reduction plan.
- Appointment of transportation coordinator to manage efforts (an employee or contractor).
- Periodic survey of employees to ensure compliance.

• Outreach:

- An employer outreach program is under development.
- Outreach materials available through CDPHE and RAQC.
- Opportunities for public engagement over next few months.

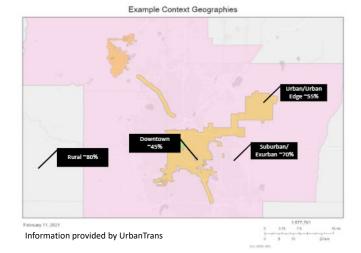
Employer Based Trip Reduction Program

Under Consideration: Tiered Approach Example

- Potential to establish SOV goals by context geography
- •Example Categorization and Goals: Downtowns: Walkable, good bicycle

connectivity, access to high-quality and frequent transit, mixed and dense land

Urban/Urban Edge: Generally walkable, high-quality but less frequent transit, mix of land uses with medium density Suburban/Exurban: Less walkable, limited transit access, single use Rural: Low density and very limited or no transit



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Other Considerations

- Phased In Implementation
- Alternative compliance approaches
- Hardship waivers and exemptions
- •Use of local governments, MPOs, consultants or transportation management organizations in lieu of internal staff to develop/oversee efforts
- Development of incentives for smaller employers to participate or for large employers to overachieve

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Cost/Benefit Analysis Considerations

In preliminary stages of information gathering to inform cost/benefit analysis. Looking at the cost of the following:

- · Providing transit passes for all employees
- · Telework/Flex Scheduling
- Installation of electric vehicle charging stations
- Employer provided car/vanpool matching services
- · Employer operated shuttle services
- Installation of bike facilities for employees
- · Cost of dedicating staff time to ETRP efforts
- · Cost of administering ETRP survey
- Employer tax incentives
- · Cost savings from employee retention
