#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Chair Nelson called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

There was no public comment.

#### **APPROVAL OF THE AUGUST 18, 2021 TAC MINUTES**

Klockeman moved to approve the August 18, 2021 TAC minutes. Relford seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

#### **AIR QUALITY AGENDA**

**2021 Ozone Season Update** – Ferko presented an update on the 2021 Ozone Season and 2019-2021 ozone Design Values. Five monitors exceeded the 2008 ozone standard of 75 ppb and another eight monitors exceeded the 2015 ozone standard of 70 ppb. There have been 73 Ozone Action Alerts so far this summer, which is the highest number of alerts since at least 2011. The RAQC's *Simple Steps. Better Air.* program has seen increased messaging engagement through a variety of strategic partnerships, earned media, and paid media.

Ferko identified opportunities for engaging in ozone planning efforts, including the development of the next State Implementation Plan (SIP). Relford asked if exceptional events would be pursued due to wildfire impact. Ferko explained that the impact of wildfire smoke is being analyzed, and it takes significant effort to submit an exceptional event demonstration. Relford noted there can be reduced visibility due to wildfire smoke without having a high ozone day. Ferko agreed the impacts of wildfire smoke on ozone are nuanced.

**GHG Budgets for Transportation Plans** – Bornhoft presented the background and overview of the Transportation Commission's proposed greenhouse gas (GHG) rule for regional and statewide transportation plans along with information on the role of modeling, role of population growth, feasibility of reductions, impact to the planning process. NFRMPO staff developed an initial analysis identifying areas of support and areas of concern, and a comment letter will be drafted for Planning Council to discuss and possibly approve at their October meeting. A joint Work Session with Planning Council and TAC will be held on Thursday, September 16 to further discuss the GHG rule and the NFRMPO's comments on it.

Baxter raised concerns about the lack of accounting of impacts to freight in CDOT's Cost Benefit Analysis, the limited amount of transit available in the NFRMPO region, and whether electricity sources and electrification of the fleet would be a more effective way to achieve GHG reductions. Klockeman noted many of the strategies used to set the GHG Reduction Levels are outside the control of CDOT and local governments and instead depend on the actions of many individual travelers.

Mallette suggested communities interested in engaging should submit comments in writing to CDOT.

#### **CONSENT AGENDA**

No items this month.

#### **ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEM**

**2021 Call for Projects Guidebook** – Cunningham identified questions on the Environmental Justice (EJ) scoring criterion raised by Planning Council at their meeting on September 2, 2021, including how the recommendations in the *EJ Plan* relate to the Call for Projects and how Disproportionately Impacted (DI) communities relate to EJ areas. The NFRMPO's *EJ Plan*, which was approved by Planning Council on April 1, 2021, included a recommendation to integrate EJ and equity into the Call for Projects.

Gordon presented a draft analysis of DI communities as defined in HB21-1266, including additional analysis based on housing cost burden for renters, owners, and all households. Relford recommended making the criteria for EJ and DI clear to Planning Council. Cunningham explained the definitions are distinct, but their intention is similar and there are overlaps in the identified areas.

Cunningham presented another option for incorporating EJ into the Call, which includes removing the subcriteria, reducing the points possible for EJ to 10 instead of 15, and increasing the points for Partnerships to 15 for large communities. Points for the EJ criterion would be awarded based on each scoring committee member's review of the EJ worksheet submitted by the applicant. Baxter recommended piloting EJ in the upcoming Call by requiring the EJ worksheet but not including EJ in the scoring criteria. Klockeman moved to approve the Call for Projects Guidebook with the change to the EJ criterion as proposed by NFRMPO staff. Buckman seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously. In addition, TAC requested MPO staff score projects with both versions of the EJ scoring criteria to provide more information on scoring for future Calls for Projects.

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

**2050 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Kick-off** – Gordon presented the proposed schedule, plan structure, and outreach phases for the NFRMPO's upcoming *2050 RTP*, with anticipated Planning Council adoption in September 2023. TAC members discussed how the Funding and Financing section should be structured. Relford asked if the NFRMPO will use the *2045 RTP* to determine compliance with the GHG rule by October 2022. Bornhoft explained the NFRMPO would re-adopt the *2045 RTP* to meet that deadline. The *2050 RTP* will also be developed to comply with the GHG rule.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**FY2021 TIP Project Delay Review** – Mallette explained there is a funding shortfall of \$1.25M for N I-25 Segment 6, and there is interest in funding southbound access to N I-25 from Johnson's Corner. Two Planning Council members have expressed interest in moving any available funding to N I-25.

Cunningham presented the findings of the *FY2021 TIP Project Delay Review*, which shows nine projects are not delayed, and three projects have a second delay. Of the three delayed projects, two are anticipated to meet their milestone in the first half of calendar year 2022. The other delayed project, the *Weld County CNG Vehicles* project, has \$2.2M in CMAQ funds and is held up due to the suspension of the Buy America Waiver process with no anticipated ad date. At the October TAC meeting, TAC will be asked to provide a recommendation on whether the Planning Council should remove the funds from the project or if a second extension should be granted.

Mallette noted there are two partially funded CMAQ projects that can accept additional funds, which are Loveland and Fort Collins transit projects. Planning Council could decide to move all returned funding to N I-25 and not award additional funds to those projects. Folkers noted COLT could only use \$120K, not \$264K. Cunningham will send an email to TAC members with additional info on the partially funded projects eligible for funding.

#### **ROUNDTABLE**

Karasko stated CDOT is initiating an update to CDOT's *10-Year Plan* and is requesting TPRs and MPOs to review their projects on the list. The priorities identified by the Planning Council in 2020 within the NFRMPO region remain unfunded and no changes are anticipated.

Gordon stated the draft *Human Services / Public Transportation Coordinated Plan* will be sent out for public comment soon.

#### **Key Points**

- In August and September 2021, sponsors provided project status information for projects with a milestone deadline of FY2021 or earlier, summarized in **Table 1**.
- Twelve projects were subject to the FY2021 delay review. As shown in **Table 1**, eight projects have met the required milestone and four projects are delayed. Three delayed projects requested consideration for a 2<sup>nd</sup> extension, one project is requiring a 1<sup>st</sup> Extension.
- The *Timberline Road Corridor Improvements* project as presented to TAC in September had an anticipated ad date of late September. The ad date has been updated to October 2021 and Staff is requesting TAC provide a 1<sup>st</sup> Extension due to this delay.

#### **Committee Discussion**

- TAC Discussed the FY2021 TIP Project Delay Review at the September 15, 2021 meeting and supported granting second extensions to all three projects with a 2<sup>nd</sup> delay.
- Planning Council was presented the Delay review at the October 7, 2021 meeting and discussed granting 2<sup>nd</sup> extensions to two projects with 2<sup>nd</sup> delays and removing the funds from *the Weld County CNG Vehicles* project due to the suspension of the Buy America Waivers and there being no anticipated ad date for the project.

#### **Supporting Information**

- The TIP delay procedure, as identified in the *FY2022-2025 Transportation Improvement Program* (TIP), applies to projects awarded by the NFRMPO Planning Council and funded through the federal CMAQ, STBG, and TA programs (or their successors/equivalents in future or past federal surface transportation legislation).
- The Delay Procedure states projects are considered delayed if they do not meet the deadline for the relevant milestone. The milestone is the advertisement date for construction projects and the "Notice to Proceed" for non-construction projects.
- The milestone deadline is the Fiscal Year identified in the project application for the relevant milestone adjusted for the difference between the first year of funding requested in the application and the first year of funding awarded.
- Construction projects that have more than one advertisement date and non-construction projects or programs with more than one Notice to Proceed are reviewed for each discrete implementation phase of the project.
- TAC may approve the first one-year extension for projects that do not meet the advertisement or notice to proceed date, if CDOT can guarantee the funds in the next fiscal year.

#### **Supporting Information Continued**

- TAC may recommend Planning Council approve a second one-year extension if a previously delayed project still cannot meet the advertisement or notice to proceed date within the fiscal year. The community may be granted a second one-year extension if extenuating circumstances exist outside the project sponsor's control preventing the project from moving forward. TAC may also recommend Planning Council remove the funds from the project and fund another project or return the funds to the pool for the next fiscal year if the funding can be guaranteed by CDOT. Project sponsors may appeal the decision to both the TAC and Planning Council. Planning Council makes the final decision on 2<sup>nd</sup> delays.
- Weld County has requested a 2<sup>nd</sup> Extension for the *Weld County CNG Vehicles* project, which is delayed due to the suspension of Buy America Waivers and has no current ad date. If Planning Council determines to not grant a 2<sup>nd</sup> Extension to the project, \$2.2M will be returned to the CMAQ pool.
- Allocation of the returned CMAQ funds will be discussed during the FY2021 CMAQ Additional Allocation discussion item later in the agenda.

#### **Advantages**

• The TIP Project Delay Procedure promotes the effective and timely use of federal funds by ensuring projects receiving Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG), and/or Transportation Alternative (TA) funds (or their equivalents in past or future federal surface transportation legislation) are making progress.

#### **Disadvantages**

• None noted.

#### **Analysis/Recommendation**

Staff recommends TAC provide a 1<sup>st</sup> Extension to the project with a 1<sup>st</sup> delay, recommend Planning Council provide 2<sup>nd</sup> Extensions to the two projects with second delays that have provided anticipated ad dates, and removing funding from the *Weld County CNG Vehicles* project, returning the funds to the CMAQ pool for allocation to be discussed and approved by Council in the upcoming months.

#### **Key Points**

- During the FY2021 TIP Project Delay Review Planning Council and TAC discussed removing the funds for the Weld County CNG Vehicles project which was granted a 1<sup>st</sup> extension during the FY2020 TIP Project Delay review and requested a 2<sup>nd</sup> extension due to the suspension of Buy America Waivers.
- Removing the funds from the project results in \$2.2M CMAQ funding being returned to the NFRMPO CMAQ pool for allocation. These funds are eligible to be awarded to projects selected in the applicable Call for Projects which have been partially funded or waitlisted. The applicable Call for Projects for this funding is for FY2020-2021.

#### **Committee Discussion**

This is the first time TAC is discussing the FY2021 CMAQ Additional Funding Allocations

The most recent additional allocation was completed in October 2020 for FY2021 STBG funds and FY2019-2021 CMAQ funds.

- As of September 2021, there is a funding shortfall of \$1.25M for N I-25 Segment 6 and there is interest in funding southbound access to N I-25 from Johnson's Corner. Two Planning Council members have expressed interest in moving any available funding to the N I-25 project.
- During the discussion of the FY2021 TIP Project Delay review at their meeting on October 7, 2021 Commissioner James proposed allocating the funding to the two partially funded CMAQ projects from the FY2020-2021 Call for Projects and awarding the remaining funding to N I-25 Segment 6.
- Two partially funded projects from the FY2020-2021 Call have verified their ability to obligate additional funding as shown in **Table 1.**

#### **Advantages**

The attached proposal allocates funding to eligible projects per the applicable TIP policies.

#### **Analysis/Recommendation**

#### Northern Colorado Bike & Ped Collaborative

Executive Summary – Wednesday, October 13, 2021 GoToMeeting Virtual Meeting

#### **Council Introduction**

NFRMPO Planning Chair Will Karspeck, Mayor of the Town of Berthoud, introduced Fort Collins Mayor Jeni Arndt and Larimer County Commissioner Kristin Stephens to the Collaborative.

#### RideNoCo: One Call/One Click Center

Cory Schmitt, NFRMPO Mobility Manager, presented about the expansion of the Mobility Program, now known as RideNoCo. Schmitt provided a walkthrough of the website, <u>rideno.co</u>, which will allow individuals to identify transportation options that are available for them. In the next two years, RideNoCo will add a trip planning tool and the ability for trip dispatching between different agencies. Fodge asked how the program will be marketed. Schmitt stated Hanna Johnson, Mobility Coordinator, has been working on building partnerships and developing an outreach plan. In addition, the NFRMPO will be getting an AmeriCorps VISTA to provide capacity for the program. Schmitt can add more information about bringing bikes onto specific transit agency vehicles.

#### **Fort Collins Active Modes Plan**

Cortney Geary, Fort Collins Active Modes Manager, presented about the upcoming Active Modes Plan. Fort Collins is in the process of visioning and starting to consider existing conditions for bicycle, pedestrian, and micromobility, with anticipated Plan completion in August 2022. The Plan will include a range of stakeholders, including a Community Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee. The Plan will also consider how to prioritize Front Range Trail projects and local connections. Wayfinding, natural areas connections, and building out RATCs will also be considered in the planning process. Fodge recommended connecting north to Wellington, better connections across I-25, and what barriers exist to connectivity. There were suggestions to include CDOT more in the planning and NoCo processes. The group discussed jargon and how to speak clearly and effectively. Geary will distribute a questionnaire. There was a question about micromobility on trails and how that impacts accessibility. Fort Collins will be leading a one-year pilot on electric bikes on trails.

#### **Call for Projects Update**

The NFRMPO Call for Projects opened on October 8 and will be open for eight weeks. CDOT will be presenting to the TAC in October to discuss federal funding in tandem with Cunningham's presentation about the Call for Projects. Information about the TAC meeting will be sent out prior to the meeting.

#### **Roundtable Updates**

Fodge stated CSU has opened its first bike roundabout on campus with an interim design. Berthoud is working with student engineers for an underpass.

Geary stated Fort Collins has been chosen to pilot advisory bike lanes on Pitkin Street between Remington Street to Smith Street. Fort Collins is considering changing Winter Bike to Work Day to February to align with the State's. Fort Collins received funding to do asphalt art pilot projects around town.

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# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY of the North Front Range Transportation and Air Quality Planning Council October 7, 2021

#### **Move to Approve Agenda and Minutes**

James **moved** to *APPROVE THE OCTOBER 7, 2021 MEETING AGENDA AS SUBMITTED*. The motion was **seconded** by Rennemeyer and **passed** unanimously. Rennemeyer **moved** to *APPROVE THE SEPTEMBER 2, 2021 and the September 16, 2021 MEETING MINUTES AS SUBMITTED.* The motion was **seconded** by Payton and **passed** unanimously.

## LEAD PLANNING AGENCY FOR AIR QUALITY REPORTS

Air Pollution Control Division (APCD)
A written report was provided.

Regional Air Quality Council (RAQC)
A written report was provided.

#### NFRMPO Air Quality Program Updates

Bornhoft stated there has been no update from the EPA on the final decision to expand the 2015 ozone nonattainment area to include Weld County. RAQC is developing transportation control measures, and NFRMPO staff has been participating in these efforts, including helping to develop Motor Vehicle Emissions Budgets (MVEB).

## METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION (MPO) AGENDA REPORTS

#### **Executive Director Report**

Mallette thanked CDOT Region 4 staff for the tour of I-25, segments 7 & 8 prior to the Council meeting. Mallette stated the Council needs to identify two directors for the Front Range Passenger Rail District Board of Directors by March 2022. Council agreed to make the recommendation at the December meeting. Karspeck suggested having interested Planning Council members reach out to Mallette or himself. Mallette noted CDOT will be reviewing the 10 Year List of Projects and having conversations with STAC and the Transportation Commission. Mallette updated the Council on the LinkNoCo project status.

#### **ACTION ITEMS:**

<u>2021 Call for Projects Guidebook</u> – Cunningham reviewed the updates to the Call for Projects, including the I-25 CMAQ set-aside, updated scoring criteria, and additional funding amounts. Cunningham summarized the discussion at TAC, including the new proposal for STBG scoring to lower the number of points to EJ to 10 and better tie the scoring to the EJ Analysis Worksheet that sponsors will complete. TAC recommended NFRMPO staff review how environmental justice scores impact overall scoring processes once projects have been awarded. James recommended switching the number of points for Economic Development and EJ. Stephens and Arndt noted their support for keeping higher points for EJ or better tying together Economic Development and EJ. Planning Council discussed the number of points to be awarded and decided to award 8 points to Economic Development and 7 points to EJ.

Arndt **moved** to approve RESOLUTION NO. 2021-20 *ADOPTING THE PROCESS FOR THE 2021 CALL FOR PROJECTS.* The motion was **seconded** by James and **passed** unanimously.

NFRMPO Comments on CDOT Greenhouse Gas Transportation Plan Budgets Rule – Bornhoft reviewed the setting and timeline for Greenhouse Gas (GHG) budgets, including the rule under review right now. Bornhoft noted the NFRMPO has received some of the data requested but is still waiting for some additional data. Bornhoft highlighted the letter's focus on the importance of developing a clear, procedurally sound GHG rule; the amount of emission reductions from the GHG rule needed to achieve State GHG goals; and the role of VMT. Bornhoft explained thirteen recommended improvements that could be made to improve the rule. Public comment on the rule is due by October 15, 2021.

James **moved** to approve *THE NFRMPO COMMENT LETTER ON CDOT'S GREENHOUSE GAS TRANSPORTATION PLAN BUDGETS RULE*. The motion was **seconded** by Rennemeyer and **passed** unanimously. Bracke abstained from voting.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEM:**

<u>FY2021 TIP Project Delay Review</u> – James noted the Weld County CNG Vehicle Replacement project is facing a second delay because of the suspension of the Buy America waiver for vehicles. James recommended funding the two partially funded CMAQ projects from the same Call for Projects, which include COLT and Transfort bus purchases, and assigning the rest to I-25 Segment 6. Councilmembers supported returning funding from the Weld County vehicle project to fully fund the partially funded projects and I-25, and granting second extensions to the other projects.

# Executive Summary of the North Front Range Metropolitan Planning Organization Community Advisory Committee

September 9, 2021

#### RideNoCo

Cory Schmitt and Hanna Johnson, NFRMPO Mobility Program staff, explained the objective of the RideNoCo project is to better connect older adults and individuals with disabilities with transportation options in Larimer and Weld counties. Schmitt reviewed the history of the One Call/One Click Center project and the phased approach to adding trip discovery and trip dispatching tools.

Schmitt provided a walkthrough of <u>rideno.co</u>, the RideNoCo website. RideNoCo does not provide transportation itself but connects people to existing options and collects data about rides that could not be completed. CAC members recommended adding trip cost information, providing additional "sort by" options, including additional transportation services like ridesharing or carsharing, and identifying providers that are door-through-door compared to door-to-door. The CAC also asked about efforts to ensure the website and transportation system are supporting the needs of the BIPOC communities in the region.

#### **Coordinated Plan**

Gordon presented on the <u>Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan</u>, or Coordinated Plan. The Coordinated Plan focuses on the transportation needs and gaps of older adults, individuals with disabilities, and low income individuals. Gordon will forward the presentation to the group. The draft <u>Coordinated Plan</u> will be released for public comment the week of September 13 before being adopted by the Planning Council in December.

#### LinkNoCo

Gordon presented on the LinkNoCo project, which is studying transit corridors to connect communities across Larimer and Weld counties. There will be opportunities for public comment via online open houses and surveys as well as through project ambassadors. Gordon will forward information about the project to CAC members. The project website is <a href="https://nfrmpo.org/transit/linknoco/">https://nfrmpo.org/transit/linknoco/</a>.

#### **Subcommittees**

Gordon reviewed the draft <u>2050 Regional Transportation Plan</u> (RTP) vision statement and goals based on the discussion at the Long Range Plan Subcommittee meeting. CAC members recommended more directly addressing underserved communities, multimodal transportation, funding, and maintenance.

The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m. The next meeting date will be November 11.

## RideNoCo Website Launch

Along with a full Spanish translation of the website this fall, this completes Phase One of the roll out of the One Call/One Click Center and delivers a centralized location to discover transportation options in Northern Colorado. # CASTA Award: Outstanding Coordination Initiative

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Mobility Services have been recognized by the Colorado Association of Transit Agencies (CASTA) for "Outstanding Coordination Initiative." Via and the NFRMPO have partnered to add service to Southwestern Weld County and Southeastern Larimer County at no charge to riders. This pilot service is supported by Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5311 funds that support rural public transportation.

This pilot launched in August of 2021 and will run until the end of 2021. From August 1st to September 13th, Via registered 30 new riders in the service area and provided 25 trips to 7 riders.

# Transfort Routes 11 & 12 Suspended Starting September 27, 2021

Due to employee shortages, Transfort will temporarily suspend Routes 11 & 12 effective Monday, September 27, until further notice. These routes have low ridership and suspending these routes will help ensure more stable service on other routes.

## Coordinated Plan Update: Timeline and Public Comment

Every four years, the NFRMPO completes the Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan, known as the Coordinated Plan for short, on behalf of transit agencies in the region. In this effort, NFRMPO staff work with the local transit agencies, Larimer County Mobility Committee (LCMC), Weld County Mobility Committee (WCMC), and stakeholders around the region to identify the existing mobility options and gaps for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and low income individuals.

The 2021 Coordinated Plan has been under development since October 2020 with feedback and input collected through surveys, community copygesatigas, and the LCMC and WCMC. The 2021 Coordinated Plan was released for 30-day public



comment on September 22nd and is open through October 22nd, 2021. Comments received will be incorporated into the plan, which will then be approved by both the LCMC and WCMC in October and November, with final adoption of the plan by the NFRMPO Planning Council at their December 2, 2021 meeting.
