

Revitalizing Main Streets Projects in the North Front Range

The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) awarded 16 projects approximately \$22 million in Revitalizing Main Streets Program Larger Safety Infrastructure Grants last week. Four of the 16 selected projects are in the North Front Range:

City of Greeley

The 16th Street Corridor Enhancement will begin with a determination of the improvements needed for pedestrian safety and upgrades to meet ADA requirements, including widening sidewalks and adding pedestrian refuges or rest areas.



City of Fort Collins

The Laporte Avenue Improvements— Fishback to Sunset Project will construct multimodal improvements along Laporte Avenue from Fishback Avenue to Sunset Street in northwest Fort Collins. This

project was also awarded Multimodal Options Funding by the NFRMPO in 2020.



Town of Berthoud

The North Berthoud Parkway Trail Gap Closure project will connect the six mew neighborhoods on the north side of Berthoud to Mountain Ave and Downtown Berthoud. The project will add a pedestrian crosswalk on Berthoud Parkway and a regional trail separate from the roadway. This project was also awarded Multimodal Options Funding by the NFRMPO in 2020.

Colorado State University

The Center Bikeway/Mountain Loop Trail Separation and Safety Enhancement will consist of physical separation of existing trail into a pedestrian walkway and bicycle trail (Mountain Loop/Center Bikeway).

The Revitalizing Main Streets Program was created as part of Colorado's COVID-19 Recovery Plan to help communities across the State implement transportation-related projects that improve safety and yield long-term benefits to community main streets. The passage of Senate Bill 260 included future allocation to the Revitalizing Main Streets program which will allow continued investments into community safety projects. Cycling Without Age along the Poudre River Trail





Everyone should have the opportunity to experience nature along the Poudre River. That is why the nonprofit Poudre River Trail Corridor Inc. opened the

Northern Colorado Cycling Without Age (CWA) program. CWA offers free rides to individuals, who because of age and/or mobility challenges, cannot independently access the Poudre Trail. CWA utilizes a special bicycle called a trishaw that seats one or two people facing forward for a storybook ride on a quiet stretch of the Poudre Trail. Trained community volunteers complete the experience by piloting the trishaw and sharing stories and sights along the way.

Since opening the Cycling Without Age program in June, over 100 community members have enjoyed a "wind in your hair" experience along the Poudre River. Most of the passengers are housebound or living in supported living situations. Rides are offered weekdays and originate from one of three trailheads located in Greeley and Windsor.

Additional Poudre Express service Now Operating



The Poudre Express added additional service Monday through Friday, now running eight westbound trips and nine eastbound trips between Greeley, Windsor, and Fort Collins. These additional trips provide additional service throughout the day, and reflect feedback from riders, community surveys, and ridership numbers. Additional Bustang service coming to the region

Bustang to Broncos is returning for this season between Fort Collins, Loveland, and Denver Union Station to bring fans to home games at Empower Field at Mile High. Tickets must be purchased ahead of time on the <u>Bustang website</u>. Service will be offered on the following dates:

- January 9, 2022

In addition, a new Bustang Outrider service is expected to operate between Sterling and Greeley and Sterling and Denver starting in the fall. Bustang Outrider on these routes will operate to Greeley Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and to Denver on Tuesday and Thursday. Service will be operated by NECALG on behalf of Bustang. 
RamsRoute has returned, serving CSU, Wagon Road Park-n-Ride, Denver Union

New GHG Transportation Planning Rule Under Consideration

The Colorado Transportation Commission (TC) is considering revisions to the State's transportation planning rule to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from the transportation sector. The proposed rule focuses on the transportation planning conducted by CDOT and by the five metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) in Colorado, including the NFRMPO.



The rule would require CDOT and MPOs to adopt transportation plans that reduce GHG emissions by the reduction levels specified in the rule. These plans would be assessed through modeling to determine the estimated future GHG emissions from the on-road transportation system, including planned transportation investments. If the GHG reduction levels are not met, the rule would restrict the types of projects eligible to receive certain funding sources, including some 10-year Plan funds available through CDOT and two federal funding sources available through MPOs: Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds.

The NFRMPO is engaging in the TC's rulemaking process for the GHG rule and is providing comments to support development of a data-driven, feasible, and effective rule. The TC is scheduled to consider adoption of the proposed rule at their meeting on November 18, 2021. CDOT is holding nine rulemaking hearings on the rule, with six hearings held in September and three hearings in October. To learn how

2050 RTP Kicks off in October

In October 2021, NFRMPO staff will kick-off the 2050 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the long-range transportation plan for the region. As with previous RTPs, the 2050 RTP will consider the entire regional multimodal transportation system, including roadways, freight, bicycle, pedestrian, and transit infrastructure, especially through the lenses of population and economic growth. Outreach and input from members of the public will guide the process as will staff and elected officials from local communities. The 2050 RTP is anticipated to be adopted by the NFRMPO Planning Council by September 2023.

The 2050 RTP will set the long-range vision for the regional transportation system; identify funding for multimodal transportation projects and note the unfunded needs; show conformity to air quality standards, including greenhouse gas emissions; and show progress toward regional and federal performance measures and targets.

RideNoCo Website Launch



The RideNoCo website has officially launched! Along with a full Spanish translation of the website this fall, this completes Phase One of the roll out of the One Call/One Click Center and delivers a centralized location to discover transportation options in Northern Colorado. Phase Two is currently underway to develop a trip planning tool to integrate with the RideNoCo website. When complete, individuals will be able to plan trips using public transit, human services transportation, and walking/biking.

Coordinated Plan out for Public Review, to be adopted in December

Every four years, the NFRMPO completes the Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan, known as the Coordinated Plan for short, on behalf of transit agencies in the region. In this effort, NFRMPO staff work with the local transit agencies, Larimer County Mobility Committee (LCMC), Weld County Mobility Committee (WCMC), and stakeholders around the region to identify the existing mobility options and gaps for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and low income individuals.



The 2021 Coordinated Plan has been under development since October 2020 with feedback and input collected through surveys, community conversations, and the LCMC and WCMC. The 2021 Coordinated Plan was released for 30-day public comment on September 23 and is open through October 22. Comments received will be incorporated into the plan, which will then be approved by both the LCMC and WCMC in October and November, with final

adoption of the plan by the NFRMPO Planning Council at their December 2, 2021 meeting.

Partner Agency Updates

I-25 North Express Lanes Project celebrates progress major milestones between Berthoud and Fort Collins completed, additional activities well underway

Every year, summer flies by, both for residents and CDOT projects. Crews on the I-25 North Express Lanes Project have taken full advantage of the long summer days to bring transportation improvements to northern Colorado between Berthoud and Fort Collins.



Right now, 42 crews are working in 25 different areas of the I-25 North corridor and have already completed many major milestones.

Here's a summary of what's been accomplished so far in 2021:

- Colorado Highway 56 over I-25 bridge was closed in August to straighten the highway curve and flip the interchange. The closure is scheduled for no more than 140 days.
- Traffic was shifted at Colorado Highway 60, US 34 and Prospect Road to move motorists onto the newly built bridges.
- The Great Western Railroad bridge was installed over I-25.
- The first phase of the mobility hub is complete at Kendall Parkway in Loveland. The mobility hub includes center access ramps for Bustang and expanded Park-n-Ride lots.

"It's been a very productive year for this project. While the various closures and detours have been impactful to the communities, we know our commuters are counting on us to continue improving our state's transportation infrastructure. CDOT is proud of the work accomplished so far and looks forward to continued progress," said Heather Paddock, CDOT Region 4 Transportation Director.
