#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Vice Chair Baxter called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

#### **APPROVAL OF THE FEBRUARY 16, 2022 TAC MINUTES**

Oberschmidt moved to approve the February 16, 2022 TAC minutes. Klockeman seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

There was no public comment.

#### **AIR QUALITY AGENDA**

**Regional Air Quality Updates** – Ferko reported RAQC is continuing development of the SIP ozone plan. Preliminary modeling shows attainment of the 2008 ozone standard in 2026 and attainment of the 2015 ozone standard at all but one monitor in 2026. Bornhoft stated another round of data requests on GHG

strategies is forthcoming. The four enterprises created with SB21-260 are developing 10-year plans and setting fee rulemakings, which may be of interest to local governments.

#### **CONSENT AGENDA**

**FY2022 CMAQ and TA Additional Allocations** – Relford moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Klockeman seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

#### **ACTION ITEMS**

**March 2022 TIP Amendment** – Cunningham described the March 2022 TIP Amendment, which includes four requests. Oberschmidt moved to approve the March 2022 TIP Amendment. Herrera seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

No items this month.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

**FY2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Tasks** – Karasko explained seven tasks were updated and no new tasks were added for FY2023. Local match estimates will be provided at April TAC meeting. If local match estimates are needed before then, she recommended using a 3-5 percent increase over the FY2022 amount. Comments on the FY2023 tasks are due to Karasko by March 28, 2022. The UPWP is scheduled for approval at the Planning Council meeting on May 5, 2022.

TAC members discussed if the 3-5 percent increase was reasonable given the 9.5-10 percent increase in construction costs. Mallette noted most work for FY2023 is already under contract; however, there are substantial IT investments required for FY2023 which are causing the expected increase. Mallette suggested a future discussion at TAC on how to address increased construction costs for awarded projects.

**FY2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)** – Cunningham explained the NFRMPO adopts a new TIP each year in line with CDOT's annual STIP adoption. The draft TIP carries forward projects programmed in FY2023-FY2025 from the current TIP, includes the projects Planning Council approved at their March 3, 2022 meeting for the 2021 Call for Projects, and includes some updates to the TIP polices. The public comment period will open April 1, 2022 and close April 30, 2022. Planning Council approval of the FY2023-2026 TIP is scheduled for May 5, 2022.

**MMOF Call for Projects Criteria** – Cunningham identified the statutory goals of the State's Multimodal Transportation and Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) program, including a new goal to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. She described the NFRMPO's draft guidelines for an upcoming call to award \$15.5M in FY2022 Federal and FY2023 State MMOF. The guidelines identify the schedule, minimum requests, maximum requests, maximum awards, set asides, and scoring criteria. Cunningham also presented the draft project application and project description forms.

The proposed set asides total \$5.6M, reducing available funds to \$9.9M, with \$5M to I-25 Segment 6 and \$600K to four NFRMPO projects. The \$5M set aside to I-25 would free up the \$5M in FY2025 CMAQ that had been set aside for I-25 in the 2021 Call for Projects and enable I-25 to receive funding more quickly. The \$5M CMAQ funds would then be awarded to partially funded and waitlisted projects from the 2021 Call with the remaining funds to be awarded in a separate Call. Mallette noted the \$5M to I-25 is from the

FY2022 Federal funds but could be switched to the state funds if preferred by TAC. Baxter noted it could depend on how many shovel-ready projects are submitted. Cunningham noted feedback on this question is needed soon to allow the set aside to be processed.

The NFRMPO guidelines reference the CDOT requirements, such as the 50 percent non-MMOF match requirement, match requirement exemptions, and required CDOT consultations. Cunningham explained the FY2022 MMOF, which are Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, have an earlier expenditure deadline than the FY2023 MMOF, which are State funds. Snow stated the US Treasury recently finalized guidance on the ARPA Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) and those funds can now be used as match for other Federal programs. This means the Federal dollars from MMOF can be used as match for other Federal funding sources such as STBG.

The draft guidelines classify projects into two categories to facilitate scoring: Category A for projects that quantifiably reduce GHG emissions and Category B for projects that do not reduce GHG or do not quantifiably reduce GHG. Scoring criteria points were updated as recommended by TAC at the February meeting. Relford recommended changing the classification of operating funding for existing fixed-route transit from Category A to Category B. TAC discussed whether the funding allotted for Category B was too low. Cunningham noted the goal is to award at least 75 percent of funding to Category A projects; however, if not enough Category A projects are submitted the guidelines state the funds could be awarded to Category B projects. Kelly asked if request limits should be updated between the two categories. Cunningham explained each agency can request up to \$9.9M in total; there is no request limit per category. Mallette explained MMOF could be restricted to GHG-reducing projects if the NFRMPO cannot meet the GHG Reduction Levels by October, so it is important to encourage GHG-reducing projects in the Call. Bornhoft and Snow clarified the restriction would apply to the State MMOF in FY2023 and beyond, not the FY2022 ARPA funds.

TAC discussed project eligibility, such as multimodal components of intersection improvement projects. Cunningham clarified multimodal elements are eligible. Baxter asked what project types are eligible under the new GHG mitigation project type that are not already eligible as multimodal projects. Cunningham explained State statute defines GHG Mitigation projects as those that reduce GHG by decreasing Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) or increasing multimodal travel. Snow stated an electric vehicle transition plan for transit vehicles is eligible for MMOF, whereas an EV transition plan for other city fleet vehicles is not eligible for MMOF based on statutory language.

CDOT requires consultation for infrastructure and transit projects and documentation of the consultation must be provided as an attachment to the MMOF application. Cunningham asked if there is interest in an application workshop hosted by CDOT. TAC members determined the applicant consultation process required by CDOT and offers of one-on-one support by CDOT and NFRMPO staff supplant the need for an application workshop.

#### **OUTSIDE PARTNERS REPORTS**

**NoCo Bike & Ped Collaborative** – A written report was provided.

**Regional Transit Agencies** – Kelly reported Transfort accepted its first two battery electric buses.

**Mobility Updates** – Schmitt stated RideNoCo's Trip Discovery Tool is under development. The Via Pilot in southern Weld County, which concluded in February, was successful and NFRMPO is working with Weld County and local communities to potentially apply for UFR MMOF to continue the service.

#### **ROUNDTABLE**

Cunningham stated the survey on the 2021 Call for Projects was sent prior to the TAC meeting. The survey results will be discussed at the April TAC meeting.

Gordon stated the next step of developing the 2050 RTP is to review regional corridors. He will send out definitions and maps for review, and TAC will discuss the corridors at the April meeting.

Baxter stated Michelle Johnson is the new GET transit manager.

# **Background**

The NFRMPO staff has drafted the Tasks and Products for FY2023 the *FY2022-2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)*. The Finance Committee will review the FY2023 Budget on April 21, and it is anticipated they will recommend Planning Council approval at the May 5, 2022 meeting. The Updated FY2022-2023 UPWP and FY2023 Budget will go to Planning Council for their approval at their May 5, 2022 meeting to allow CDOT and FHWA approval prior to October 1, 2022.

The modified FY2023 UPWP Tasks, which updated since the FY2022-2023 UPWP was adopted on May 6, 2021, are:

- Task 2.1: Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Management
- Task 2.3: Transportation Model Management
- Task 3.2: Outreach/Communications
- Task 3.3: Air Quality Planning, Conformity, and GHG Emissions Analysis
- Task 4.3: Federal and State Funds Management
- Task 4.4: Mobility Management
- Task 4.5: One Call/One Click Center (RideNoCo)

These Tasks are also attached to this Memo.

#### **Action**

NFRMPO staff requests TAC recommend Planning Council approval of the updated FY2023 UPWP Tasks at their May 5, 2022 meeting.

# **II. Plan Development**

## 2.1 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Management

#### Objective:

This Work Task allows for monitoring and revising the NFRMPO 2045 RTP and the development of the 2050 RTP. The 2050 RTP will incorporate updated performance measure targets as part of each component including the 2023 CMP, 2021 ATP, 2022 Public Involvement Plan (PIP), and project selection through the 2023 Call for Projects.

#### Method:

The NFRMPO Planning Council adopted the 2045 RTP in September 2019. This Work Task includes the necessary staff effort to complete administrative modifications and amendments to the RTP as necessary. Modifications are completed for minor corrections or clarifications, while Amendments are completed for major changes such as adding or deleting regionally significant projects or advancing or delaying project completion dates to a different conformity band. The 2050 RTP development includes goal setting, transportation system analysis, required fiscal constraint, public involvement, conformity determination, RSCs, project prioritization, and the incorporation of the 10 planning factors from federal regulation. The NFRMPO will incorporate a larger transit section into the RTP in lieu of a standalone RTE. The NFRMPO, Denver Regional Council of Governments (DRCOG), Grand Valley MPO (GVMPO), Pikes Peak Area Council of Governments (PPACG), and Pueblo Area Council of Governments (PACOG) regularly share best practices for planning and public involvement for the development of the RTPs. This Task also completes the Environmental Justice (EJ) and Environmental Mitigation (EM) analyses.

#### Overall Impact/Intent:

This Work Task monitors and revises the 2045 RTP as necessary and develops the 2050 RTP. It will monitor the implementation and completion of any Modifications or Amendments to the 2045 RTP. A long range, financially constrained, transportation plan allows projects to move into implementation in the TIP and sets the funding priorities for the region.

## 2.3 Transportation Model Management

#### Objective:

This Work Task manages and updates the 2015 Regional Travel Demand Model (RTDM) for the NFRMPO region and the adjacent air quality nonattainment area.

#### Method:

This Work Task manages and updates the RTDM. The RTDM uses the Land Use Allocation Model (LUAM) output, network, and operational data to assign traffic to the roadway network. There is also a transit network for assigning trips to the transit systems. The models provide information used for the development of the RTP and conformity determinations for the RTP and TIP. The NFRMPO makes the RTDM available to local member governments for their own use. The NFRMPO will contract for traffic counts as needed to provide accurate data and will enhance the model to improve the representation of induced demand, VMT mitigation strategies, and work from home.

NFRMPO staff provide data and analysis, such as network and traffic counts, and run the RTDM. Consultant assistance is used to build and/or update the RTDM model and for support on an as needed basis following the building of the new RTDM.

#### Overall Impact/Intent:

Modeling capabilities are critical to the NFRMPO RTP efforts and the TIP. These essential capabilities contribute to the success of the travel demand projections, future scenarios based on policy direction, conformity determinations, and support of local planning efforts both long range and immediate developments.

This Work Task includes the publication of NFRMPO reports, including the quarterly newsletters, educational brochures, and the development and update of the NFRMPO website.

- The quarterly newsletter contains current information on transportation projects, studies, and NFRMPO, VanGo™, Mobility Coordination, and member agency activities.
- The website provides information about the NFRMPO, meeting information, transportation information as well as an information request function. NFRMPO staff provides summaries on the blog and links to recently published articles.
- The VanGo<sup>™</sup> Facebook page provides information on vacant seats and posts notices on upcoming events. NFRMPO and VanGo<sup>™</sup> also Tweet about upcoming meetings and events.
- The Community Remarks<sup>™</sup> webpage provides an interactive tool for the public to comment on the transportation system and to comment on upcoming plans.

## Air Quality Planning, Conformity and GHG Emission Analysis

#### Objective:

This Work Task allows for collaborating with partner agencies on transportation-related air quality initiatives, programs, and requirements and the completion of transportation conformity determinations. Conformity is determined for the RTP and TIP as well as for portions of the Upper Front Range Transportation Plan and Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) within the Northern Subarea of the Ozone Nonattainment area. Conformity is redetermined for air quality significant Amendments to the RTP and/or TIP.

In December 2021, the Colorado Transportation Commission approved the Greenhouse Gas Planning Standard that set GHG reduction levels for the NFRMPO to achieve through its RTP. The RTP needs to comply with the reduction level identified in this document.

#### Method:

NFRMPO staff complete this Work Task by engaging in stakeholder processes for transportation-related air quality initiatives, completing analysis and reporting to meet any state and federal requirements related to air quality, consulting with the Interagency Consultation Group (ICG), preparing model results for air quality analysis, contributing to the development of the State Implementation Plan (SIP), completing documentation of transportation conformity, and soliciting public feedback on conformity determinations.

During the first part of 2022, NFR staff has worked closely with CDOT staff to develop the analysis tools necessary to carry out the GHG analysis. This includes the ability to estimate GHG emissions in-house.

#### Overall Impact/Intent:

The purpose of this task is to ensure the NFRMPO's plans and programs conform to the SIP and meet federal and state requirements related to air quality, including ozone and GHG.

#### **4.4 Mobility Management**

#### Objective:

This Work Task ensures a consistent and integrated approach to regional mobility management programs, projects, and strategies outlined in the federally mandated NFRMPO Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan). This program will work in tandem with and support the One Call/One Click Center project.

#### Method:

Staff implements the approved Coordinated Plan's projects and programs through the Larimer County and Weld County Mobility Committees (LCMC and WCMC). The NFRMPO will seek opportunities for additional collaboration between the two committees to improve regional mobility. Staff developed the Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan, to be adopted in December 2021. Staff conducts outreach in each County through presentations and individual meetings with the goal of providing information regarding Coordinated Plan programs, One Call/One Click Center project, and transit services in the North Front Range area. This includes the implementation of a One Call/One Click Center in Larimer and Weld counties. Staff participates in committees, conferences, studies, and meetings that relate to mobility management or regional and/or state transit issues. Examples include the Colorado Mobility and Action Coalition (CMAC), CASTA conferences, Mobility and Access Priority Group/Senior Transportation Coalition (STC), and others. Staff also supports Mobility Committee member agencies through production and distribution of outreach materials and responds to information requests from member governments, other agencies, and individuals regarding transit information.

#### Overall Impact/Intent:

The intent of the Mobility Management Program is improvement of transportation services in the North Front Range region for medical, employment, and other destinations particularly for seniors, people with disabilities, veterans, and low-income individuals. This task also helps to coordinate with and provide technical assistance to human service-related transportation programs and services to enhance service and maximize available resources.

#### 4.5 One Call/One Click Center (RideNoCo)

#### Objective:

This Work Task supports the implementation of the One Call/One Click Center project and related Transportation Demand Management (TDM) activities, coordinating rides for human service, volunteer, and transit agencies in Larimer and Weld counties. This project was initially identified in the 2017 Coordinated Public Transit/Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan).

#### Method:

Mobility Manager and staff implement the One Call/One Click Center project first identified in the 2017 Coordinated Plan through the management of a Call Center and website containing information on available transportation options in Larimer and Weld counties. The capabilities of the website and center will increase through the purchase of software and the hiring of staff to support the One Call/One Click Center and Mobility Program. The Mobility Manager and Mobility Coordinator meets with stakeholders, including riders, providers, and local government officials; manages the purchase and implementation of new software; leads projects to market the program; and provide assistance to individuals in need of transportation. The NFRMPO will purchase trip discovery software, trip dispatch software, and implement a staff training program to use this new technology. The MPO's TDM Program builds upon the work of RideNoCo by adding a business/employee component to the project.

#### Overall Impact/Intent:

The intent of the One Call/One Click Program is to coordinate transportation services within the North Front Range planning area as well the entirety of Larimer and Weld counties for medical, employment, and other destinations particularly for seniors, people with disabilities, veterans, and low-income individuals in addition to the general population. This service will connect individuals in need of a ride with the most appropriate and affordable options to meet their unique needs.

# **Background**

In June 2021 the Colorado State Legislature passed Senate Bill (SB)21-260 – Sustainability of the Transportation System. The passage of SB21-260 made several changes to the State's MMOF funding program. Additionally, the Transportation Commission made updates to the distribution and local match reduction formulas. Updates for the current round of MMOF funding include:

- Updating the Program name to Multimodal Transportation and Mitigations Options Fund;
- Expanding the purpose of the program by adding additional program goals;
- Expanding project eligibility to include projects which will mitigate transportation related emissions of Greenhouse Gases (GHG); and
- Updating the distribution and local match reduction formulas.

At the February 16 and March 16, 2022 TAC meetings, NFRMPO Staff presented the draft guidelines for the upcoming NFRMPO MMOF Call for Projects. The NFRMPO has a total of \$15,457,986 in FY2022 and FY2023 MMOF funding to award. Updates have been made to the guidelines following the February TAC meeting, including:

- MMOF Call for Projects Schedule
- NFRMPO and CDOT Region 4 Set-Aside requests
- Updated available funding based on approval of the Set-Asides
- Updated maximum request amounts
- Details on local match requirements and reduction options
- Revised scoring criteria based on TAC's discussion and input
- Performance measure and Environmental Justice information

The Planning Council discussed the MMOF Call for Projects at their meeting on April 7, 2022. Council requested applicants of new transit service projects include a sustainable funding plan with their applications outlining funding for the transit service past the two years of funding being awarded in the 2022 MMOF Call for Projects. Funding included in the plan may include FY2022 and FY2023 MMOF, and any other secured funding or funding anticipated to be available for the transit service that is not awarded through a competitive process (excluding FTA Formula Funds). This requirement has been added to the Guidelines.



NFRMPO Staff will be hosting a virtual Project Applicant Workshop on May 9, 2022 to discuss details of applying for MMOF funds and answer questions applicants have about the application process.

# **Background**

The NFRMPO staff has drafted a new Travel Demand Management (TDM) Task for FY2022 the FY2022-2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The new Task supports the development and implementation of a TDM program in the MPO region. A TDM Action Plan will be implemented by working with stakeholders identified in the Plan. # 4.6 Transportation Demand Management (TDM)

#### Objective:

This Work Task supports the development and implementation of a Transportation Demand Management (TDM) program in the MPO region. A <u>TDM Action Plan</u> will be implemented by working with stakeholders identified in the Plan. The TDM Program will develop and expand regional resources, strategies, and partnerships to reduce single-occupancy vehicle trips and address air quality issues, greenhouse gas and ozone emissions reductions.

#### Method:

The NFRMPO developed a <u>TDM Action Plan</u> through the work of the TDM Work Group in FFY2022, which identifies goals and vision to develop the regional TDM Program. The Work Group will continue to guide the implementation of the program. The NFRMPO's TDM Program builds upon the work of RideNoCo by adding a business/employee component to the project and act as an educational resource for businesses. In addition, the NFRMPO will support the development of a Transportation Management Association/Organization (TMA/O) through staff support, salary for a TDM Manager position, and indirect/program costs.

#### **Overall Impact/Intent:**

The intent of the TDM Program is to develop strategies to reduce single-occupancy vehicle trips, address air quality issues through greenhouse gas emissions reductions, ozone emission reductions and provide additional transportation opportunities for residents and visitors in the region. This program will be a partnership of the NFRMPO and other stakeholders throughout the region.

# **Background**

Prior to each Regional Transportation Plan update, the NFRMPO staff reviews Regionally Significant Corridors (RSCs), Regional Active Transportation Corridors (RATCs), and Regional Transit Corridors (RTCs) for accuracy and appropriateness. NFRMPO staff sent out current RSCs, RATCs, and RTCs for review by TAC members, NoCo Bike & Ped Collaborative, Larimer County and Weld County Mobility Committees, and through social media. Recommendations were considered, specifically for how recommendations fit into the criteria for RSCs, RTCs, and RATCs:






# **Proposed Regionally Significant Corridors**






# **Proposed Regional Active Transportation Corridors**

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#### Scoring process and regional needs



- 1. Scoring should be completed by a committee and not MPO Staff
  - Staff score applications as an exercise and to ensure projects are eligible but are non-voting members of the scoring committees

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



Re: Federal and Regional Performance Measures

#### **Background**

In 2018, the NFRMPO set targets for PM3: System Performance for the first performance period (2018-2021). For the second performance period, the NFRMPO is required to set two additional PM3 CMAQ Traffic Congestion targets: Non-Single Occupant Vehicle (SOV) Travel and Peak Hours Excessive Delay (PHED). The traffic congestion targets for the second performance period are only required to be set for the urbanized areas (UZA) over 200,000 in population and within non-attainment or maintenance areas for ozone, carbon monoxide, and particulate matters. For the NFRMPO and CDOT, this requirement applies to the Fort Collins UZA. Additionally, the traffic congestion targets are required to be set in conjunction with the State.

#### **Non-SOV Targets**

NFRMPO staff analyzed commuting data from 2015-2019 American Community Survey (ACS) and created two likely target setting scenarios as shown in **Table 1**, attached. An explanation of the methodology, why the target is achievable, and how the targets support current transportation plans and programs is included in the attached presentation.

#### **PHED**

CDOT has been working on modeling annual hours of peak hour excessive delay and is scheduled report the modeling data and proposed targets to NFRMPO Staff in a meeting on April 18, 2022. The results of the modeling and the proposed targets will be provided to TAC in the handouts to be discussed at the meeting.

#### **Action**

Staff requests TAC review the proposed joint targets and be prepared to discuss at the meeting.



Stephens **moved** to *APPROVE THE APRIL 7, 2022 MEETING AGENDA AS SUBMITTED* and *APPROVE THE MARCH 3, 2022 MEETING MINUTES AS SUBMITTED.* The motion was **seconded** by Mallo and **passed** unanimously.

#### **AIR OUALITY AGENDA**

#### **REPORTS:**

#### NFRMPO Air Quality Program Updates

Bornhoft stated the judicial stay on the nonattainment designation for northern Weld County was denied, provided updates on the Policy Directive for implementing the GHG Rule, and noted Air Quality Awareness Week is occurring May 2-May 6, 2022.

#### **METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION (MPO) AGENDA**

#### **REPORTS:**

Report of the Chair – Karspeck recognized the service of Isbell. Olson will serve as the transit representative on the Planning Council.

<u>Executive Director Report</u> – Mallette provided legislative updates, noted the NFRMPO will conduct in-person outreach this summer, stated efforts on the Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Plan have begun, and explained the Federal Certification process is underway and a survey from FHWA is available.

#### PRESENTATION:

<u>CDOT Region 4 10-Year List of Projects</u> – Heather Paddock, Region 4 Transportation Director, provided an update on the 10-Year List of Projects. The List uses the same TPR split among the four TPRs within Region 4 as was used previously, providing \$80M to the NFR region for years 5-8 across five projects. The List includes \$95.2M for North I-25 Segment 5 and Paddock identified several options for securing additional funding for the project. A GHG analysis on the 10-Year List will be conducted to determine compliance with the GHG Rule.

#### **CONSENT ITEM:** FY2022 CMAQ and TA Funding Allocations

Stephens **moved** to *APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA RESOLUTION NO. 2022-07*. The motion was **seconded** by Isbell and **passed** unanimously.

#### **ACTION ITEMS:**

#### March 2022 TIP Amendment

Stephens **moved** to approve the RESOLUTION NO. 2022-08 *APPROVING THE MARCH 2022 AMENDMENT TO THE FY2022-2025 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)*. The motion was **seconded** by Mallo and **passed** unanimously.

#### Off-Cycle March 2022 TIP Amendment

Olson **moved** to approve the RESOLUTION NO. 2022-09 *APPROVING THE OFF-CYCLE MARCH 2022 AMENDMENT TO THE FY2022-2025 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP).* The motion was **seconded** by Stephens and **passed** unanimously.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS:**

<u>FY2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Tasks</u> – Karasko stated seven tasks are being updated for FY2023 with budget revisions to be presented at the Planning Council meeting on May 5, 2022.

<u>2022 Title VI Plan</u> – Karasko described the updates included in the 2022 Title VI Plan. Planning Council will consider adoption of the Plan at the Planning Council meeting on May 5, 2022.

<u>FY2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)</u> – Cunningham explained updates to the projects and narrative for the FY2023-2026 TIP, stated an online interactive map of projects is available, and noted the public comment period for the TIP is open through April 30, 2022.

MMOF Call for Projects Criteria – Cunningham explained the proposed process for the NFRMPO's MMOF Call for Projects, including project categories, maximum requests, minimum requests, and scoring criteria. Council members discussed how to consider ongoing operations needs for transit service expansion projects given the MMOF funding amounts in FY2024 and beyond are much lower than funding available in FY202 and FY23.

#### 2. Group Introductions and Review of Agenda

Both virtual and in person attendees introduced themselves and their organizations.

#### **Presentations**

#### 1) NFRMPO MMOF Call for Projects – Cunningham

Cunningham presented about the MMOF Call for Projects. She reviewed the history and background of the funding source, as well as how the program was renewed and expanded through Senate Bill 21-260 – extending the funding for 10 years. The goals for MMOF were set by the legislature and are outlined in Cunningham's slides (attached). The opening call for these projects is May 6<sup>th</sup> and applications will be accepted for 4 weeks; final NFRMPO Planning Council approval is scheduled for August 4<sup>th</sup> (full schedule in attached slides). Cunningham reviewed project eligibility, categorization, and scoring criteria. Cunningham noted funding match requirements, exceptions, and that communities can request a match reduction in line with CDOT Transportation Commission Standards.



Bedingfield asked if SB 21-290's funding was separate; Cunningham and Schmitt note that SB 21-260 funding, which reinstated CDOT MMOF funding, is separate. MMOF funds can be matched with anything that is not MMOF funding. Project applications will be due in early June with the Scoring Committee meeting on either June 14<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup>. The NFRMPO is seeking 1-2 Mobility Committee members to serve on the Scoring Committee as non-voting members to provide feedback on the proposed projects. Members interested in serving on the MMOF Scoring Committee can reach out or can direct any questions to AnnaRose Cunningham at arcunningham@nfrmpo.org.

#### 2) NFRMPO RideNoCo Updates – Schmitt/Johnson

Schmitt gave an update on the roll out for RideNoCo. Phase I is complete; phase II is in motion; phase III will kick off with the first meeting of the Trip Scheduling Steering Committee on March 31<sup>st</sup>. RideNoCo's website, Rider's Guides, and call center are now officially available in Spanish.

The Trip Discovery Tool has a target completion date of Summer 2022. Providers in the Planner include: Transfort, COLT, GET, BATS, Bustang, Estes Transit, SAINT, RAFT, 60+ Ride, Via Mobility, Bustang, RTD, and Rocky Mountain National Park Shuttles. SPIN e-Bike and e-Scooter will also be included.

Johnson gave an update on RideNoCo Outreach Efforts. NFRMPO staff gave 16 presentations in 2021, and 7 in quarter 1 of 2022; distributed 1,219 Rider's Guides in all of 2021 and 516 in quarter 1 of 2022. Johnson requested that if mobility committee members want to partner with RideNoCo on various outreach efforts, to please reach out to her directly to set up anything from travel trainings, to coboothing at outreach events, to sharing outreach materials. She can be reached at <a href="mailto:hjohnson@nfrmpo.org">hjohnson@nfrmpo.org</a> to discuss outreach collaboration.

#### Mobility Action Plan Activity - Johnson/All

Johnson presented a compiled version of the brainstormed Action Plan goals from the last LCMC and WCMC meetings (see slides below for further details). The brainstormed goals are as follows:

- 1. Create a shared resource library.
- 2. Educate LCMC/WCMC members on transportation programs/options available.
- 3. Educate community members of Larimer and Weld Counties on availability of transportation options.
- 4. Recruit and engage at least one LCMC and WCMC member from a healthcare system.
- 5. Create a shared driver training program or direct providers to existing state and regional programs.
- 6. Create a mentor program.
- 7. Compile an inventory of current mobility infrastructure and voucher programs.
- 8. Identify new funding sources.
- 9. Increase interdisciplinary participation in LCMC and WCMC AND/OR Create a recruitment working group



The group gave feedback on each goal. For goal 5 "Create a shared driver training program", Bitzer noted that Via Mobility offers training to other agencies for CDL and non-CDL drivers as well as volunteers. Multiple people noted the similarities between goal 4 and 9 and requested to combine these goals. Russo and Martinez noted that the infrastructure inventory may already be compiled by the county Offices on Emergency Management. During the discussion, the group generally commented that giving feedback to staff about goals would be good.

After discussing each goal, in participants voted for their top 5 prioritized goals. The votes were as follows (in order of most to least votes):

- 1. Goal 3 13 votes
- 2. **Goal 4/9 13 votes**; participants requested to combine these goals
- 3. **Goal 1: 9 votes**
- 4. Goal 2: 8 votes
- 5. **Goal 8: 8 votes**
- 6. Goal 7: 6 votes
- 7. Goal 5: 2 votes resolved with Via's driver training program
- 8. Goal 6: 1 vote

#### Wrap Up + Next Steps

Based on the feedback during the discussion and sticky note comments, staff will form 2 work groups that will meet during WCMC and LCMC meetings: an Outreach and Education Work Group, led by Johnson, and a Recruitment Work Group. NFRPMO staff will get feedback from WCMC and LCMC as needed for the goals related to resource coordination.

#### **Upcoming MMOF Call for Projects**

The next round of MMOF funding has a goal to make transportation more widely available to older adults, people with disabilities, and rural communities. The NFRMPO has a total of \$9,857,986 in Federal (FY2022) and State (FY2023) Multimodal Transportation and Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) funding to award. Shovel-ready projects will be prioritized for federal funding. The primary goals of this funding source include:

- Benefitting seniors by making aging in place more feasible;
- Benefitting residents of communities in rural and disproportionately impacted communities by providing them more accessible and flexible public transportation services:
- Providing enhanced mobility for persons with disabilities;
- · Providing safe routes to school for children;
- Increasing access to and/or usage of transit or multi-use facilties; and
- Reducing emissions of air pollutants, including hazardous air pollutants and greenhouse gases, that contribute to environmental effects.

#### **Envision & NFRMPO Expand Relationship**

Beginning in January 2022, the NFRMPO has expanded its' funding support for Envision Creative Support for People with Developmental Disabilities. Following the delivery of a MPO-supported wheelchair accessible van in January 2021, the MPO now provides support for all of Envision's transportation services for people supported by reimbursing Envision for a portion of all rides completed by the organization. This support assists Envision with more effectively and efficiently meet the mobility needs of people they support, and in turn increases access to the broader community and region.



Envision's Executive Director Celeste Ewert shared: "I'm sure that many of you who are reading this understand that providing transportation services is extremely costly, and with the increase in gas, maintenance and other expenses it's only more challenging. Prior to this grant, Envision was losing about \$120,000/year in providing this critical service to people. Thanks to the collaborative effort with the NFRMPO, this grant significantly contributes to our ability to continue providing transportation. We are very grateful to have been awarded this very generous grant!"








#### Via Pilot in Southern Weld County Concludes



In 2021, Via Mobility Services and the NFRMPO partnered to bring a new transportation option to rural communities in southwestern Weld County on a pilot basis at no charge to riders. This pilot service was supported by Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5311 funds that support rural public transportation. The pilot ran from August 2021 through the end of February 2022.

During the duration of this pilot, Via provided 461 trips and registered 74 riders across 11 communities. 42% of trips transported riders to health-related services and 70% of riders were aged 60 or older.

Due to the wide success of this pilot, the NFRMPO, Via, and other partners are currently working to secure funds to continue the service beyond March. For more details about the Via Pilot Service, please click here.

## **Background**

The Off-Cycle March 2022 TIP Amendment includes four revision requests. The following four project revisions are Off the Top funding allocations of MMOF funds:

- Revising the North I-25: WCR38 to SH402 project by adding \$5,000K Federal MMOF funding
- Rolling the NFRMPO's *Expansion of Mobility Program* project from the FY2020-2023 TIP, revising the name and description, and adding \$300K State MMOF funding and \$300K local funding.
- Adding the NFRMPO's *Premium Transit Analysis Phase 2* with \$125K Federal MMOF funding and \$125K local funding.
- Adding the NFRMPO's *TMO Startup Funds* with \$75K State MMOF funding and \$75K local funding.

The attached Off-Cycle March 2022 Policy Amendment Form provides additional information on these requests.

The NFRMPO Finance Committee recommended moving forward with programming the Off the Top Set Asides from the 2022 MMOF program on an accelerated timeline at their meeting on March 24, 2022. The accelerated timeline allows for CDOT to utilize MMOF funding quickly and allows for the NFRMPO to begin contracting with CDOT as soon as possible on NFRMPO sponsored projects.

The 30-Day Public Comment period for the Off-Cycle March 2022 TIP Amendment began on March 25, 2022 and will conclude on April 24, 2022.

At their meeting on April 7, 2022, the NFRMPO Planning Council approved the addition of the Off Cycle March 2022 TIP amendment to the FY2022-2025 TIP with Resolution 2022-09 contingent on no negative comments being received prior to the end of the 30-day public comment period.
