NoCo Shift Your Ride Challenge



The NoCo Shift Your Ride Challenge encourages participants to shift at least one ride a week from a single occupant vehicle (SOV) to an alternative mode during September and October. There are 83 participants from all around Northern Colorado. The communities

represented are Fort Collins, Larimer County, Windsor, Eaton, Estes Park, Greeley, Loveland, and Timnath.

By shifting their ride, participants are lowering their carbon footprint and contributing to the region's efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. If you would like to participate, you can sign up at nfrmpo.org/shift. The website also includes access to different resources including the Regional Alternative
Transportation Map. This map contains trail information, existing transit lines, and even includes sidewalk locations. The site also has the Greenhouse Gas Emissions Calculator which will allow you to track your Greenhouse Gas emission reductions.

NFRMPO Wraps Up Summer Outreach

Following a two year pause on attending in-person events, NFRMPO and RideNoCo staff attended 16 events between April and September 2022. From LaSalle to Eaton, Fort Collins to Berthoud and several cities and towns in between, NFRMPO Staff interacted with over 3,600 community members. During the events, visitors to the NFRMPO booth of all ages spun the Transportation Trivia wheel to win prizes including bike lights, water bottles, and globe stress balls. Trivia questions spark conversations between players and staff about the NFRMPO, RideNoCo, and VanGoTM in addition to helping educate the community about bike and pedestrian safety, mobility options, and ozone issues.



Some of the major themes which were discussed throughout the summer were transit options in the North Front Range, including future community connections and the LinkNoCo study; bike and ped safety, including the Bike and Ped Safety Reporting Tool and the Colorado Safety Stop; and the NoCo Shift Your Ride campaign.

Public Involvement Plan Open for Public Comment

Every four years, the NFRMPO updates its Public Involvement Plan (PIP), which identifies the NFRMPO's goals, desired outcomes, and strategies for the public involvement process. Additionally, the PIP identifies what the public should expect from the NFRMPO, including accessible and transparent information, and acknowledgment of the public's opinions, values, and needs.

The 2022 PIP includes lessons learned about public engagement during the time of COVID-19 as well as updated strategies to be implemented including the use of new technology and partnership opportunities.

for members of the community to
provide input into the transportation
planning process at all stages of project
development. NFRMPO staff facilitate
meetings, educating the public on
NFRMPO process and how they can get
involved in transportation planning at
the regional and local levels. The CAC
meets virtually every second Thursday
of the month. Any community member

who does not currently serve on an NFRMPO Committee is eligible to apply.

Severance Walk Audit

The Town of Severance and the NoCo Bike & Ped Collaborative led a Walk Audit through the town on August 10, 2022. More than 20 attendees walked the one-mile loop, discussing improvements to sidewalks, crossings, and trails as they went. A few key themes were discussed:


- Accessibility, including the grading of the trails, wheelchair access, and signage
- Connectivity, including sidewalk widths, consistency, and otherwise
- Need for shade and other pedestrian amenities
- Safe crossings, especially crossing Weld County Road 74 on the Great Western Trail

LinkNoCo Draft Report Released for Public Comment

In early 2020, the NFRMPO Planning Council approved Multimodal Transportation & Mitigation Funds (MMOF) for the development of a regional transit study called the North Front Range Premium Transit Analysis. The



purpose of this study, now dubbed LinkNoCo, is to prioritize corridors for investments in premium transit, building off the work in the 2045 Regional Transit Element (RTE).

Throughout 2021 and 2022, the NFRMPO worked with its consultant, HDR, to convene a Guidance Committee (GC) and Governance and Finance Policy Advisory Committee (GFPAC), undertake public engagement throughout the process, analyze the 2045 RTE corridors, prioritize the corridors with recommendations for implementation, and identify funding and governance for the recommended corridors.

2045 Regional Transportation Plan 2022 RTP Update



The NFRMPO has updated the 2045 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) to comply with the Colorado GHG Planning Standard. The 2045 RTP 2022 Update incorporates new project data from three Calls for Projects, more specificity in projects, and a redistribution of funds toward supporting multimodal investments in the region's transportation system. The 2022 Update also adds additional detail on Transfort's West Elizabeth Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project.

As required, the NFRMPO completed a Conformity Determination Report for the 2022

Update, which also included the expanded Northern Subarea of the nonattainment area to include all of northern Weld County. Based on results from CDPHE Air Pollution Control Division (APCD), the 2045 RTP 2022 Update passed conformity for the 2008 and 2015 ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). A 30-day public comment period on the Conformity Determination was open from August 26 through September 25, 2022. A public hearing related to the conformity determination was held October 6, 2022, and no comments were received.

The NFRMPO released the 2045 RTP 2022 Update on August 19, 2022 for public comment. The 2045 RTP 2022 Update was approved by the NFRMPO Planning Council on October 6, 2022, and will be submitted to CDOT, FHWA, and FTA for their approval.

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NFRMPO staff continues progress on the 2050 RTP. Major updates for the 2050 RTP underway include:

- Improvements to the Land Use Allocation Model (LUAM) and Regional Travel Demand Model (RTDM)
- Vision planning for the Regionally Significant Corridors (RSCs), Regional Transit Corridors (RTCs), and Regional Active Transportation Corridors (RATCs)
- Performance management, including setting of new and updated performance measures and targets



Transit Agencies in Northern Colorado See Increased Ridership Through Fare Free Transit Month



Transit can have a sizeable impact on improving our air quality, and funding from SB22-180-Programs to Reduce Ozone Through Increased Transit is making free transit possible to do so. Throughout the month of August 2022, transit agencies across the state provided a month of fare transit. In the NFRMPO region, Greeley Evans Transit (GET) and City of Loveland Transit (COLT) provided fare-free transit in

addition to the currently free Transfort in Fort Collins. Here are the results of ridership comparing August 2022 to August 2021:

COLT: +33%GET: +38%Transfort: +14%

All three agencies are working on recovering ridership back to 2019 pre-Pandemic levels, and efforts like Zero Fare for Better Air are making it more possible. It is expected the program will return for August 2023, which falls during the heart of the region's ozone season.

Bustang Service Announcement



Beginning on September 6th, CDOT's state-wide transit service Bustang added 2 additional daily round trips on the North line serving Fort Collins, Loveland and Denver (see schedule below). Service information can be found at this link:
