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RAQC Programs Update:

- **Mow Down Pollution (residential)** reopened since the last Board Meeting utilizing existing funds (people who reserved but didn't use a voucher). We will likely shut down for the year as interest has continued - but funds are nearing their end.
- **Mow Down (local government)** is now in its 2nd round where current recipients can request another \$50,000, and new applicants can request \$100,000.
- **Mow Down (commercial)** pilot is running with the first few applicants. Small grants of \$3,000 each are available and can be increased with additional funding.

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Lawn & Garden Equipment Control Strategies

RAQC Board to consider regulations impacting the sale and use of gasoline-powered lawn and garden equipment at its July 7 meeting.

- Prohibitions on the sale of gas-powered push and hand-held equipment in the nonattainment area, beginning in 2025.
- Limitations on governments and commercial operators' use of gas-powered push and hand-held equipment in the nonattainment area, during June-August, beginning in 2025 for governments and 2026 for commercial operators.

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Lawn & Garden Equipment Control Strategies

What the proposed regulatory requirements are not:

- The restrictions on sales of gas-powered push and hand-held L&G equipment are not statewide but proposed for the nonattainment area only, so this equipment would be available for sale outside the nonattainment area.
- Restrictions on the sale and use of larger gas-powered riding equipment and tractors are not included in this emission control strategy proposal.
- The sales and seasonal use restrictions are not intended to apply to forest or grassland management nor do these restrictions apply to fire hazard reduction activities in or near wildland areas or the wildland urban interface.
- The seasonal use restrictions are not intended to apply to abating or preventing damage during a declared emergency.
- The sales and seasonal use restrictions are not intended to apply to equipment used by first responders to provide emergency services.
- Restrictions on residential use of gas-powered lawn and garden equipment are not included in this emission control strategy proposal.

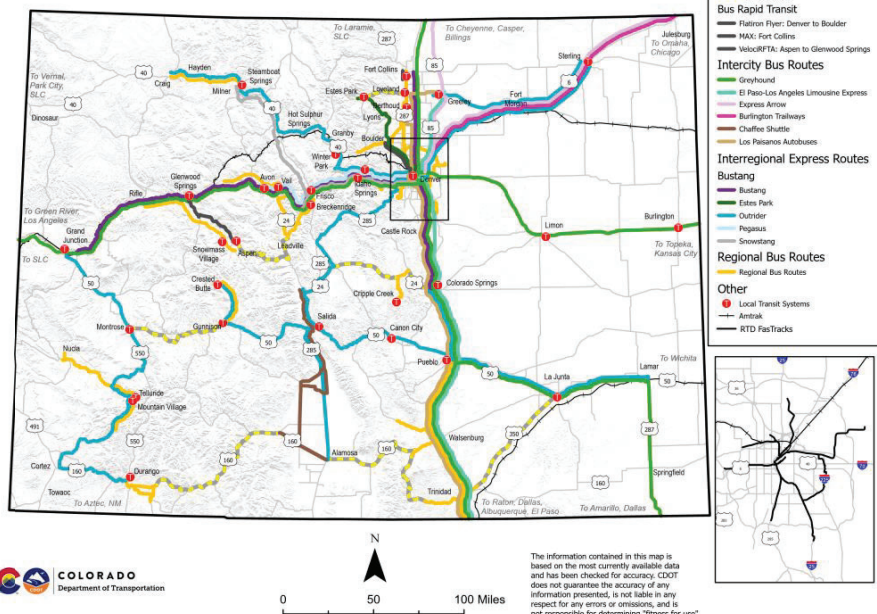


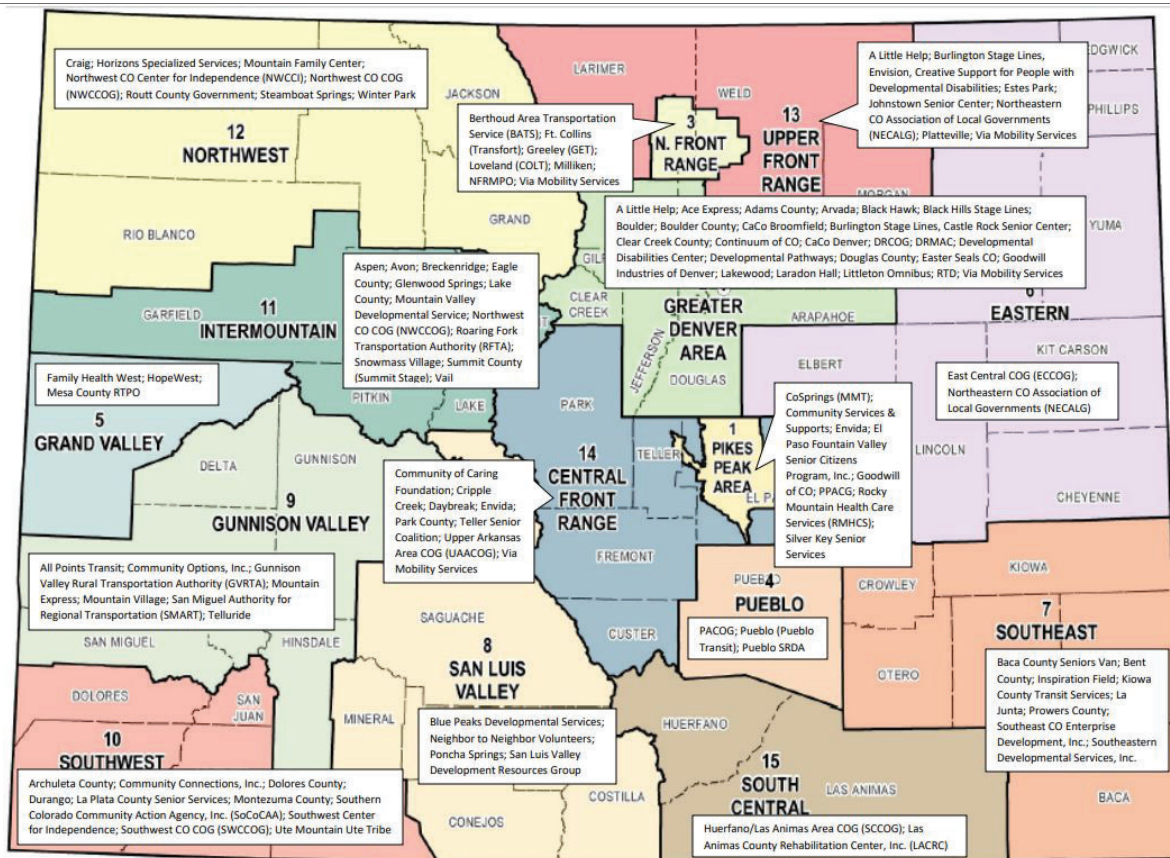
Colorado Transit Network

- Invest \$121M in Local Transit
 - Expanding Services in Crowley County to a New Bus Garage in Kim
- Committed Nearly \$120M in Bustang
 - Mobility Hubs
 - Bus Purchases
 - Outrider
 - Planned 92 Stops
 - Bustang Expansion Plan
 - \$30M in Funding for Service along I-70 and I-25
- \$70M to Support Region 1 BRT Routes

Colorado-Wyoming Transit Feasibility Study

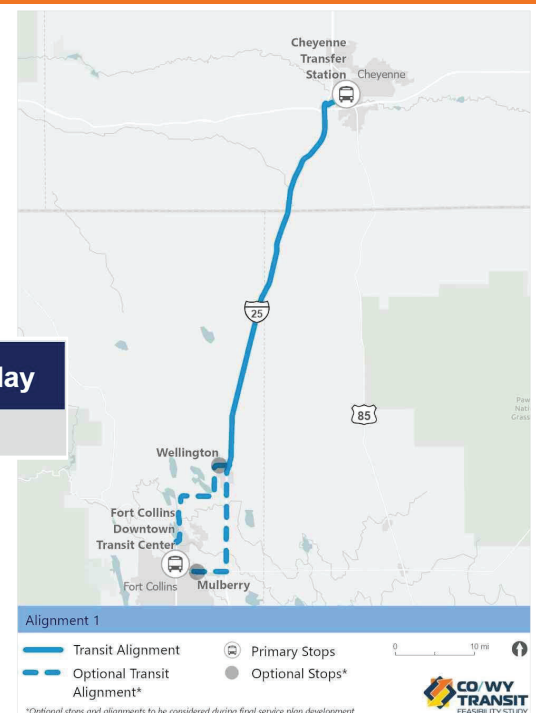
- Cheyenne MPO, WYDOT, CDOT

Colorado-Wyoming Transit Feasibility Study

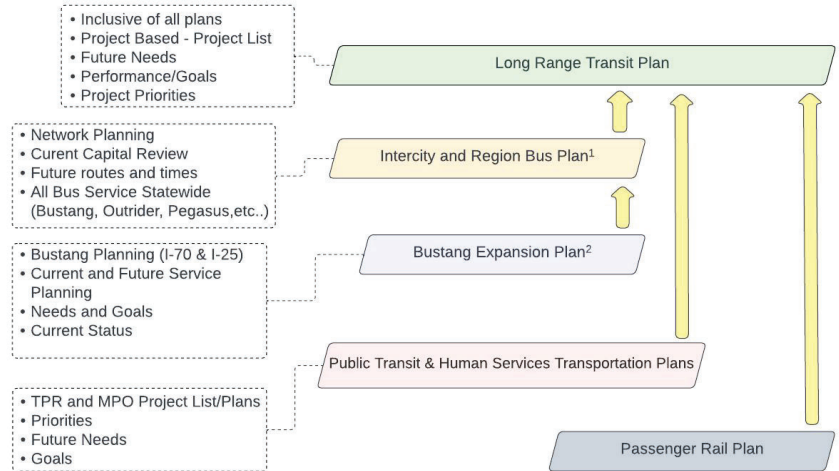
- **Final Recommended Alignment**
 - Alignment options into Fort Collins Downtown Transit Center
 - Other routes studied included I-25 and US 85 options
 - Optional stops

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Operations & Maintenance Costs

2050 RTP

- **Roadway Operations**
 - Includes lighting, traffic control, snow and ice removal
 - **Roadway Maintenance**
 - Includes resurfacing costs
 - **Total O&M Cost**
 - \$25,138 per lane mile
- Reviewed O&M costs with TAC
 - O&M Costs only to maintain the current condition level
 - Future consideration may be made to set a target for condition level

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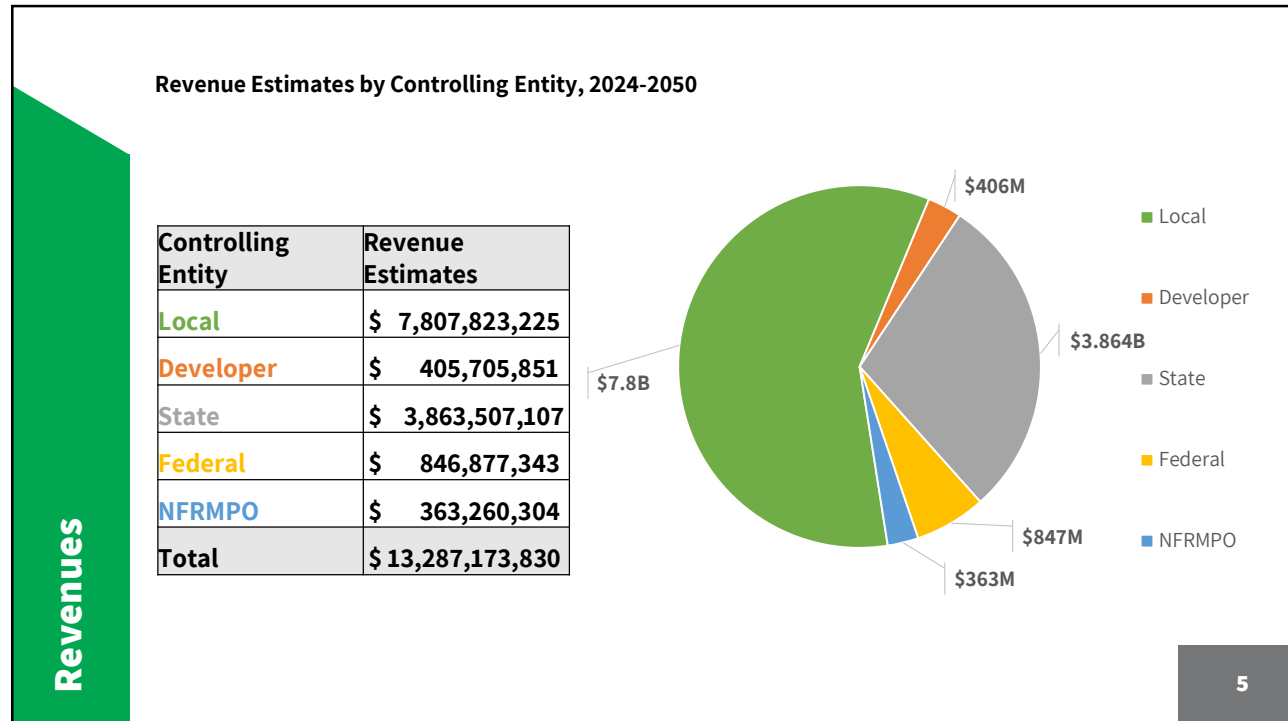

2050 RTP

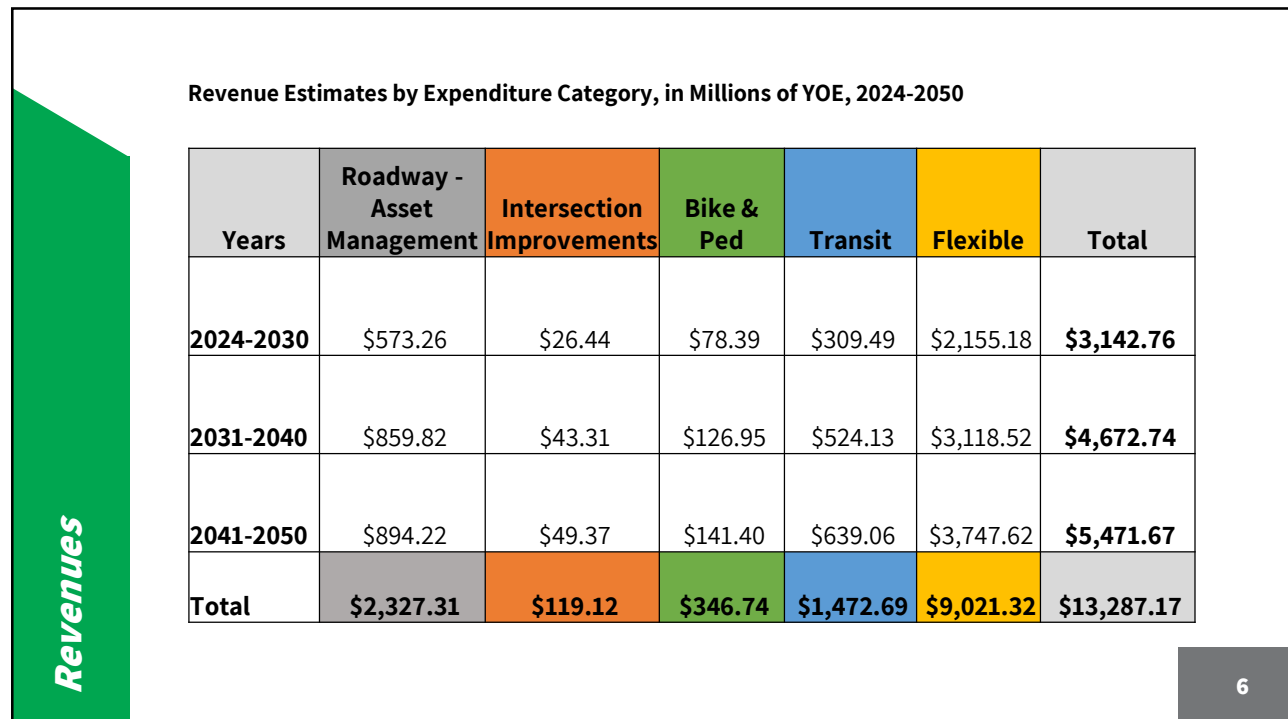
- Front Range Passenger Rail
 - Removed from fiscally constrained plan after discussion with FRPR
 - Included in Regional Transit Corridor (RTTC) and Unconstrained Plan Projects
- Should additional funding become available:
 - Roadway operations and maintenance
 - Regionally Significant Corridor (RSC) capacity projects
 - Project list included in Unconstrained Plan Projects

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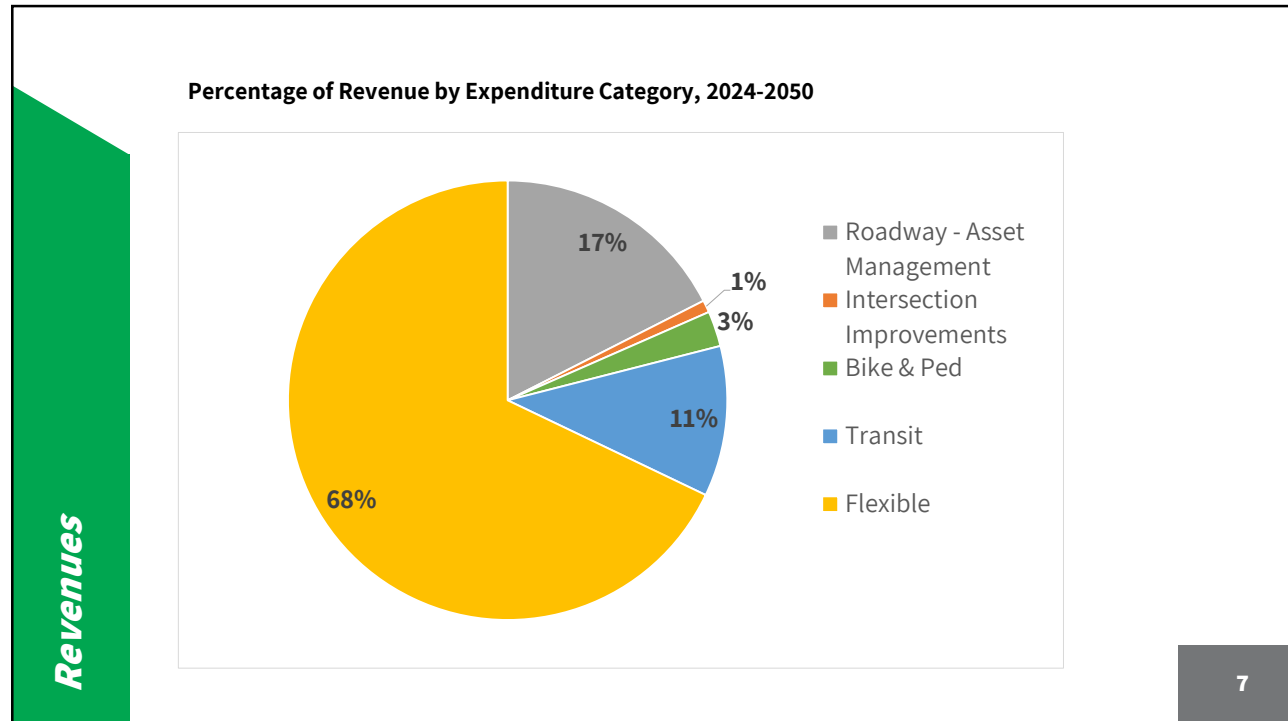
