I-25 & Mulberry Interchange Improvements



Project Location

I-25 and Colorado Highway 14 (Mulberry Street) interchange in Fort Collins

- I-25 North, between Mile Point 269 and MP 271.
- Includes the Mulberry Street interchange and the frontage road connections in Larimer County and the City of Fort Collins (for approximately one mile along CO 14, from MP 138.7 to 139.25).





Project Overview

Proposed improvements will address:

- Unconventional traffic operations,
- Flooding concerns
- Aging infrastructure
- Traffic growth and regional population growth
- Safe and multi-modal-friendly connection point for pedestrians and cyclists






Background information North I-25 EIS Report

- Recommended 3 general purpose and 1 Express Toll Lane in each direction from Denver to CO 14/Mulberry Street
- Rebuild CO 14 interchange as a diamond
- Carpool lot at CO 14 interchange
- West frontage road undercrossing
- Realign northeast frontage road
- Record of Decision 2011

SH 14 Interchange






Background information Interchange Type Selection Report (2016)

Projected traffic to 2035 and evaluated:

- Standard Diamond with Signal
- Standard Diamond with Roundabouts
- Partial Cloverleaf
- Single Point Urban (SPUI)
- Diverging Diamond (DDI)

This study did not recommend a specific interchange type. CDOT is open to looking at other options as part of the project.





Project Goals



- Enhance safety
- Support an equitable transportation connection of neighboring communities for good paying jobs
- Improve projected levels of service for traffic growth, high turn volumes, future transit, and increased bicycle/pedestrian traffic
- Bridge replacement and improve riding surface
- Address floodplain issues
- Modernize the site for increased use of electric vehicles
- Coordinate with stakeholders and the public to reach an economically feasible design alternative
- Secure construction funds

- Equity Analysis Worksheet
- Detailed Cost Estimate Per Unit/Phase
- Project Prioritization by Category
 - If member government submits more than one project app per category
- Sustainable Funding Plan (transit projects)

If Feasible:

- Letter of Support from Mayor/Town Administrator or Resolution of Support from local government council/board
- CDOT Letter of Support/Concurrence (ITS or State Highway impacts)

Executive Summary – Wednesday, October 9, 2024 GoToMeeting Hybrid Meeting

Multimodal Transportation Options Fund (MMOF) Call for Projects

Northrop outlined the MMOF program goals and funding estimates. There is \$4,541,288 available in this call for fiscal years 2025-2028. Northrop discussed the major due dates. Draft applications are due on October 25th and final applications are due November 15th. Northrop gave an overview of the MMOF Guidelines document and application requirements. There are two project categories: Category A and Category B. Category A projects are quantifiable GHG reducing projects and Category B projects are non-quantifiable or non-GHG reducing projects. Northrop noted all projects must be in compliance with the NFRMPO's various plans, including the 2050 Regional Transportation Plan and the 2021 Active Transportation Plan.

The group discussed what projects are eligible for MMOF funding and where to find additional information.

Climate Smart, Future Ready Plan Metrics

Pruess gave a summary of previous NoCo Bike & Ped discussions around metrics. Pruess noted the main metric currently is vehicle miles traveled (VMT) and requested feedback for additional metrics. The group discussed using bike and pedestrian counters as an additional data point to assist with these efforts. The group discussed the different counters that are on the market.

Active Transportation Data

The group continued the discussion on bike and pedestrian counters. Comments included regional collaboration on count data, new counter technologies, counter maintenance and software updates, and troubleshooting technical difficulties with current counters.

Roundtable

Rouser stated the <u>2025 Active Transportation Plan</u> survey closed on September 27th. Rouser noted NFRMPO staff will begin the RATC visioning process and begin meeting with local agency staff.

Wilson noted the Eastman Park South project is nearing completion and will be having a ribbon cutting soon.

Wilkinson stated the Duran section of the Poudre River Trail will be closed for six to eight weeks for trail reconstruction and riverbank stabilization. The Poudre Ponds project will begin in December and will result in an additional section of the trail being closed. The City of Greeley submitted a grant application for a trailhead at 59th Avenue and for improvements near Missile Site Park.

2025 Active Transportation Plan Update

Rouser gave an overview of the <u>2025 Active Transportation Plan</u> (ATP) timeline and noted the plan is still anticipated to be adopted in early 2025. Rouser stated there were 263 responses to the 2025 ATP survey with responses from 19 zip codes. Rouser noted the survey closed on September 27th. Rouser gave an overview of the geographic distribution of survey results. Rouser and the group discussed the survey results. The group discussed strategies to improve bicycle and pedestrian safety along roadways, including strategies to curb reckless driving.

Regional Active Transportation Corridor (RATC) Overview

Rouser gave an overview of the Regional Active Transportation Corridors (RATCs) and noted they are intended to be used for all types of active transportation trips and are planned to be fully built out by 2045. Rouser outlined each of the 12 RATCs, including which communities the corridor impacts, total corridor length, and population within ½ mile of the corridor in 2020 and 2045. Throughout the presentation, Rouser noted the significant population growth along many of the corridors and provided an update on future plans on the corridors. The group discussed the corridors' alignment, including comments on how to make the corridors as commuter-friendly as possible.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:15 p.m.
