# July 2025 Report from the Air Pollution Control Division to the North Front Range Transportation and Air Quality Planning Council Thursday, August 7, 2025

Air Pollution Control Division (Division) Public Participation Opportunities:

• Environmental Justice Summary Dashboard: Most air pollution sources in Colorado must submit an environmental justice summary before applying for an air permit. That means environmental justice summaries provide early notice before the division receives an air permit application. The environmental justice summary dashboard allows users to find a specific facility by name or enter a zip code for a list of recent submissions within a one-mile radius. ## Air Quality Control Commission (Commission) Updates:

#### July 17, 2025 Commission Meeting

- Common Provisions: The Division will request that the Commission set a hearing to consider revisions to the Common Provisions regulation to address HB20-1143 with respect to inflation adjustments for maximum fines and penalties for air quality control violations.
- Regulation Number 6, Part A Stationary Source Performance Standards: The Division will request that the Commission set a hearing to consider a proposal to revise Regulation Number 6, Part A (NSPS) to incorporate by reference changes the EPA made to its New Source Performance Standards and/or Emission Guidelines.
- Regulation Number 8, Parts & E Hazardous Air Pollutants Performance Standards: The Division will request that the Commission set a hearing to consider revisions Regulation Number 8, Parts A and E (MACT Standards) to incorporate by reference changes the EPA made to its National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants rules.
- Ozone State Implementation Plans (SIP) and Associated Regulations: The Division
  will request that the Air Quality Control Commission set a hearing for proposed
  elements to Colorado's State Implementation Plans (SIP) under the 2008 and 2015
  ozone National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) and revisions to associated
  regulations including Regulation Number 3, Regulation Number 7, Regulation Number
  11, Regulation Number 25, Regulation Number 26 and the Air Quality Standards,
  Designations and Emission Budgets.

#### August 20-22, 2025 Commission Meeting

- **Secondary SO2 Designation:** The Division will request that the Commission set a hearing to consider a designation recommendation for EPA's revised secondary SO2 National Ambient Air Quality Standard.
- Edge Environmental, LLC v. Air Pollution Control Division, Case Number 21036A and 2038A-01, Adjudicatory Hearing Matters: Air Pollution Control Division's Motion for Partial Summary Judgment.
- Regulation Number 31 Landfill Methane Regulation: The Commission will consider establishing a new Regulation Number 31 to address municipal solid waste landfill greenhouse gas control and monitoring requirements.

Attendees introduced themselves and their organizations, along with an icebreaker.

#### **Approval of Last Meeting's Minutes**

April 22, 2025, minutes approved by Robinson and seconded by Conaway.

#### **Meeting Location Discussion**

Discussion was sparked by the decision from the Weld County Mobility Committee to move to an in-person meeting. Hull went over the bylaws of the committee for review. Central locations were discussed for upcoming meetings, contingent upon a vote to change the meeting format. These



locations included – the MPO office in Ft. Collins, Larimer County Offices in Ft. Collins or Loveland, Libraries in Loveland or Ft. Collins, or rotating locations.

Robinson proposed a hybrid approach and identified pathways as a potential location. Many members like the idea of a hybrid for in-person engagement. Conaway made a motion to change meetings to hybrid; Kelly made a second to the motion, and Herkenhoff a third. A survey will be sent out after the meeting to vote on locations.

#### **RideNoCo Updates**

Hull provided YTD updates as of 7/22/25 for RideNoCo, along with upcoming outreach and engagement events.

Discussed the Riders Guide updates, English/Spanish, and ADA versions now available.

Coordinated Plan outreach is wrapping up.

#### Presentation

#### **Transfort Optimization Plan Presentation and Discussion**

Phillips gave a robust presentation from Transfort. The slides were provided in the packet. Time was then given for questions and comments. Both Kelly and Cunningham discussed their preference for scenario two, and Cunningham inquired about the current firmness of the micro transit boundaries. Phillips responded that they would still need to be dialed in. Herkenhoff discussed the need for potential service out west to the Mental Health Facility. It will be explored additionally in the future. Conaway asked if smaller routes were considered instead of larger routes or neighborhood loops. Phillips stated that they are exploring options for areas not currently represented on the map, focusing on those with the greatest need and potential for success. Cooper said she would love to see more affordable housing options available up north and on Trilby. Additionally, access through Vine would be appreciated by the individuals who live in that area.


#### What is a TMO?

A Transportation Management Organization (TMO) is a collective effort comprising various community stakeholders that collaborate **to develop and implement strategies promoting sustainable transportation options and reducing congestion**.

TMOs act as the **operational arm of Transportation Demand Management (TDM) efforts** and are responsible for outreach, marketing, events, advocacy, and programming/services.

The NFRMPO's **2050** Regional Transportation Plan and TDM Action Plan identify TDM strategies, including the development of a TMO, as necessary for meeting emission reduction targets and alleviating congestion.
