Introductions and Icebreaker

Attendees introduced themselves and their organizations, then participated in an icebreaker.

Public Comment

There was no public comment at this meeting.

Approval of Last Meeting's Minutes

Motion made by Kaliczak and seconded by Conaway for approval of the October 28th, 2025, meeting minutes.

RideNoCo Updates

Hull reported new categories and other improvements added to the RideNoCo CallSheet to improve tracking of caller demographics in the call center. He pointed out that Deaton cleaned up all call information collected in 2024 and 2025 and added new categories to improve reporting accuracy. Hull compared 2024 and 2025 calls and website visits; website visits in 2025 jumped 92% from 2024, and calls remained about the same. He shared the heatmap of where calls originated in 2024 and 2025. Calls in 2024 were more widespread, extending beyond Larimer and Weld Counties; in 2025, they mostly originated within the MPO region.

Deaton discussed the upcoming Aspen Club/RideNoCo Transportation Fairs and asked the group to share to increase public attendance. Deaton announced RideNoCo and the NFRMPO outreach calendar of events for the quarter. She talked about how mobility and the MPO teams are attending more events together to represent the entire organization, year-round, not just during the summer festival months.

Hull provided an update that the RideNoCo Trip Planning/Discovery tool currently on the RideNoCo website is being replaced with MyWayToGo. MyWayToGo offers more tools for trip planning, carpooling options, challenges and incentives, and will eventually have its own app.

Hull announced that the regional TDM working group will start monthly regional events to discuss regional marketing campaigns. RideNoCo is working to expand the TDS system to include additional agencies and to find ways for all user software to work together. The TMO call for projects is currently in progress, with applications due by the end of the week. Hull talked about how RideNoCo has changed website hosting to a new provider and that a new RideNoCo website will be coming soon. Another project that RideNoCo is working on is a public version of the provider's guide, which is essentially a very comprehensive Rider's Guide.

Hull led a discussion on combining the LCMC, WCMC, and NCMC into a single committee and renaming it the North Front Range Coordinating Council. It will need to be decided if it meets every month, bi-monthly, or quarterly. Kaliczak said quarterly meetings are not enough and that monthly meetings would be best. He said that bringing everyone together in a regional conversation about mobility would benefit both counties.

Discussion Items

Transfort Optimization Study Presentation - Phillips

Phillips introduced the Transfort Optimization Plan and began with the project overview, purpose, and goals. She explained the purpose is a short-term transit service plan grounded in financial

constraints, focused on community needs and growing ridership. She shared that they prioritized a fare-free system, community engagement, best practices, adaptation, design, and financial feasibility. Phillips shared details of Transfort's expenses and revenue since 2019, as well as the anticipated receipt of funding in 2027. She discussed that transit is a City priority and key strategy for achieving City goals by implementing the Transportation Master Plan recommendations. She pointed out the three scenarios for public feedback that included travel patterns, rider demand, and microtransit, and the feedback they received. Feedback from the community, data, evaluation of the existing system, and best practices formed the foundation for the recommended plan. Phillips then shared recommended frequencies and service hours, as well as long-term service expansion options.

Phillips discussed the Dial-A-Ride service area impacts and mitigation. She explained that changes to the fixed-route service will reduce the Dial-A-Ride service area. Those who are already clients will not be affected; new clients will have to be within the $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from a fixed route.

Phillips talked about safety and security and the partnership with police and Transfort. Transfort will repurpose funding originally allocated to additional TSO positions to support the partnership with police services, the Homeless Outreach and Proactive Engagement Team (HOPE), and the Mental Health Response Team (MHRT). The program timeline is 10/2025 – 12/2028.

Phillips talked about the next steps and that they are in the final phase of public engagement and will continue to take feedback through February and into the first week of March. She said that after the March feedback deadline, they will make any necessary changes and move on to further public engagement while working on the implementation plan. The plan should be implemented in August 2026.

Hull asked whether the presence of ICE is affecting ridership and whether ICE agents will be allowed on buses. Phillips said it is unknown what impact it is having on riders and will follow up on whether ICE can be allowed on buses, since buses are public spaces.

Cunningham asked about how many stops would be removed and added with the new plan. Phillips said that they are working through that and predicted maybe 30 new stops, but does not have an exact amount yet.

Hull asked about staffing and whether they will need to increase or decrease staff. Phillips said that they are not anticipating many changes. Hull also asked whether there would be any changes to the FLEX route, and Phillips said she does not anticipate any.

Mobility Case Study - Deaton

Deaton discussed a person in Loveland who has Medicaid, uses Transdev for medical rides, but is looking for a service to run errands and do shopping. They live outside of COLT and SAINT's boundaries, and they need a ride for a non-medical appointment in Fort Collins, where the FLEX line would put them right where they need to go. Kaliczak said that since he has Medicaid, they

could get up to 208 non-medical rides per year. For help with this, they should contact Foothill Gateway to get a case manager to help them complete the paperwork and submit it to the state.

Deaton discussed a second case study about a couple, 82 and 83 years old, neither of whom has mobility issues, who lack Medicaid for medical trips. They realize that Windsor's affordable transportation options are limited, and they plan to decide whether to move to Windsor based on transportation options when they no longer drive. Conaway mentioned that they have looked at expanding services to Windsor and that they think it would be great if someone were motivated to create a new service there. Kaliczak discussed situations in which people use a ride service and then move to a new location, not realizing the service may not be available there. She asked how the MPO handles sharing the bad news. Conaway suggested that the MPO should start travel training, such as teaching people how to use rideshare apps. Hull said the PAFC provides technology training, and Conaway asked whether the PAFC goes into those communities to help. Hull said he would ask at the next PAFC meeting. Hull also mentioned that Uber and Lyft have versions of their apps geared towards older adults, and that Uber riders can call in to book a ride, so they don't need a smartphone. Kaliczak mentioned that she taught a class with the PAFC at the Chilson Center on zTrip, Uber, and Lyft, and questioned why Windsor isn't doing something similar. Penfold asked if RideNoCo had Uber and Lyft at the Transportation Fairs. Deaton said no, but another rideshare that attended, called the Colorado Co-Op, is very similar.

Vander Broek announced a large Bike-To-Work station at the CSU oval and that they will have 3-4 projects at the Transportation Projects Fair in Fort Collins.

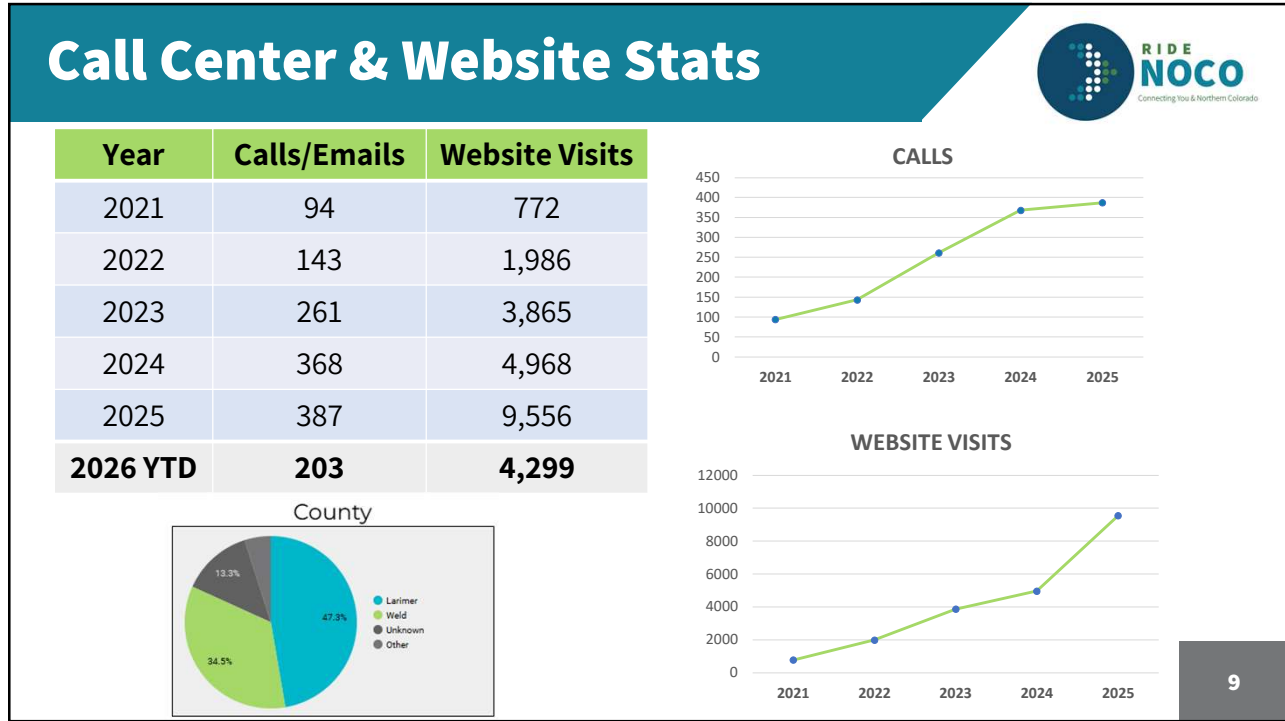

Website Redesign

Our redesign focuses on clarity and access, especially on mobile devices. We simplified the menu, improved page speed, added robust content, and aligned with accessibility standards so people can quickly find services, meetings, data, and request ride referrals.



Diversifying Funding to Expand Impact

We're expanding beyond traditional transportation grants to include healthcare, philanthropy, and corporate partners whose missions align with ours. For example, health systems and plans fund transportation to reduce missed appointments; community foundations invest in equitable access; employers support first/last-mile solutions to improve retention; utilities and air-quality partners back e-bikes and efficient fleets.

Our case is outcome-based: for every dollar invested, we deliver measurable benefits, fewer missed medical visits, better workforce access, and lower emissions.

Innovation: From Referral to Ride: End-to-End Coordination



- **Expand RideNoCo** to support *closed-loop referrals* from healthcare, care management, and human service agencies
- **Add community referrals** on the website, allowing caregivers and individuals to submit self-referrals (EN/SP)
- **Real-time tracking** and notifications ensure referrals are scheduled and completed
- **Streamlined workflows** reduce handoffs and manual follow-up and prevent individuals from "falling through the cracks."
- **Richer data** for outcomes and reporting, understanding needs and gaps, along with community-specific data.

That means better service for older adults, people with disabilities, and low-income and rural residents, as well as stronger evidence for funders and partners.

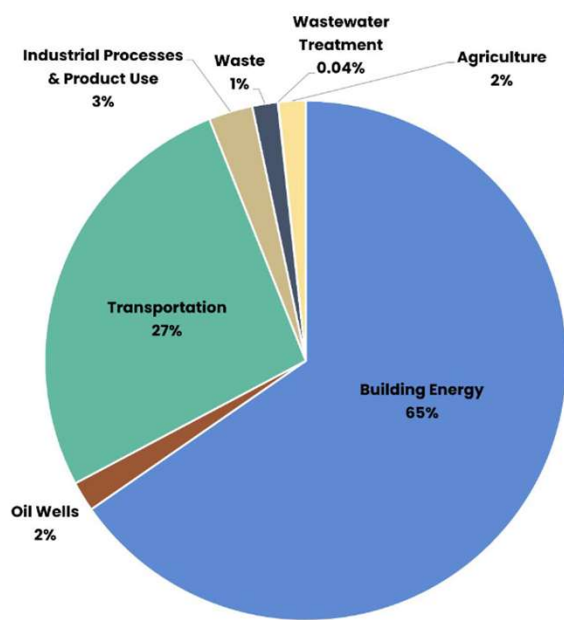

Mobility Case Study



- Doc is over 60 years old and uses an electric wheelchair.
- He lives in Fort Collins and needs a ride to get an MRI with sedation and to other doctor appointments within Fort Collins.
- *He requires door-through-door service since he cannot walk far.*
- We provided him with transportation agencies in the area that may be able to help. He said that he cannot afford to pay and that his Medicaid denied rides with Transdev.
- We referred him to Disabled Resources and Foothills Gateway for assistance. Turns out he already has case managers at both places.
- He continues to call asking us to follow up for him with Medicaid, Disabled Resources, and Foothills Gateway. We have explained that the only thing we can do is provide resources.

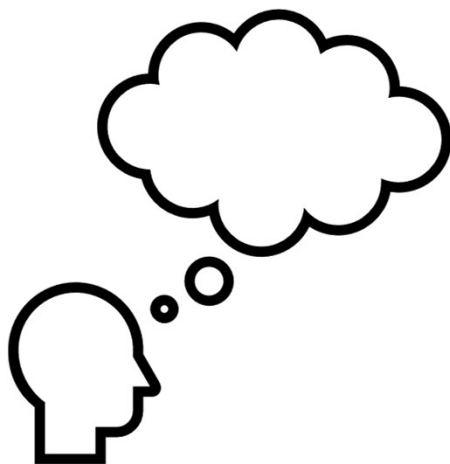

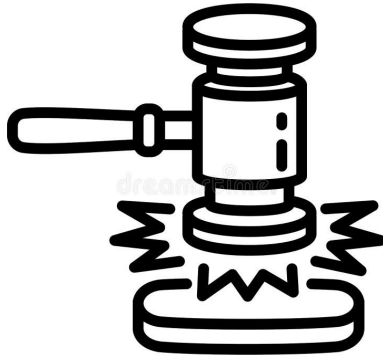

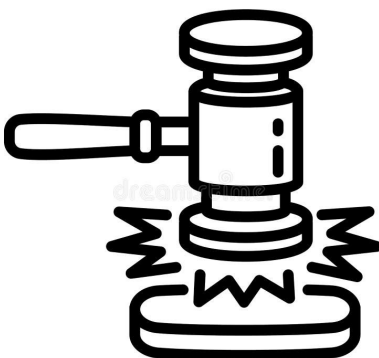
