Introduction

Attendees introduced themselves and their organizations.

Public Comment

There was no public comment at this meeting.

Approval of Last Meeting's Minutes

Motion made by Robinson and seconded by Torres to approve the January 27, 2026, meeting minutes.

Chair & Vice Chair Elections

Hull announced that it is time to elect the chair and vice chair positions for the LCMC. Hull said that the current chair and vice chair, Kelly and Robinson, respectively, have served a year and can continue to serve another year if they want. Kelly and Robinson asked the group whether anyone wanted to take over their positions; no one did at this time. It was then moved by Edgley and seconded by Cunningham, and the motion was passed.

Mobility Program Updates

RideNoCo Updates

Joyner gave the RideNoCo call center and website stats for the year to date. She compared them to the 2025 YTD numbers, and calls increased by 56% and website visits by 109%. She briefly discussed the new RideNoCo website coming soon and how it should impact call center numbers. Joyner shared the RideNoCo and the NFRMPO upcoming events through July 2026.

Staff Activities Since Last Meeting

Trujillo-Martinez provided an update on the new RideNoCo website, which is in the final stages of development and expected to soft launch soon. She discussed efforts to diversify funding for the RideNoCo program beyond traditional Section 5310 federal grants, with an increased focus on the health impacts of transportation. She also described an innovation grant awarded to RideNoCo by the Colorado Office of eHealth Innovation (OeHI). The grant will support technology upgrades for the call center, including electronic referrals from care providers, tools to identify the most appropriate transportation provider for everyone, and the ability to transmit referrals electronically. The goal is to create a closed-loop referral system that allows the RideNoCo call center to track whether rides are successfully fulfilled.

Hull presented the Mobility Action Plan Update (MAP) and explained that the purpose of the plan is to provide goals and actionable items that align with the Coordinated Plan. He said that, with the changes to the mobility team, the plan has not been updated since 2023, and that the team will work on the updates internally and bring them to the NCMC meeting in May. He said that the team is hoping to streamline the document for an Executive Summary, One-Pager.

Hull summarized the 2023 Mobility Action Plan (MAP) goals and progress to date and reviewed the 2026 MAP goal areas, key components, and success measures. Discussion focused on the 2026 priority area of driver capacity, training, and safety, including how agencies track safety performance and complaint trends. Members shared current approaches, including passenger, rider, and volunteer driver surveys, as well as SAINT's onboarding process, which includes a driver manual, safety guidance, and a driver application. Trujillo-Martinez discussed potential opportunities for RideNoCo to support SAINT in collecting safety-related feedback and reporting to advance shared safety goals.

Mathis raised concerns about regional connectivity between Loveland and Fort Collins, noting challenges for individuals with disabilities and their caregivers when traveling to medical facilities. He also identified ongoing difficulties securing transportation to and from the Fort Collins/Loveland Airport and noted potential impacts should commercial service resume.

Hull reported that the MPO will review and update the Articles of Association in 2026 to incorporate the Mobility Committee bylaws. Topics for consideration include whether to consolidate the three mobility committees, adjust meeting frequency, confirm meeting locations, and determine an approach for chair/vice-chair representation by county.

Climate Smart Future Ready Overview and Update

Pruess provided an introduction and overview of the Climate Smart Future Ready Plan. She outlined objectives to improve air quality and human health, increase community resiliency, and improve equity and quality of life in Larimer County. She noted a goal to exceed a 45% Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction, with a target of 60% by 2030. Pruess reported that more than fifty community partnerships—spanning municipalities, the private and nonprofit sectors, and academic partners—support the plan's implementation and help identify needs. She reviewed milestones, completed actions, and summarized the cost-benefit analysis, noting that each dollar invested has generated an estimated \$2.50–\$7.00 in community benefit. She identified the three largest contributors to the cost-benefit results as building code updates, preservation of open land and natural resources, and wildfire mitigation and forest restoration. Pruess also shared dashboard snapshots showing strategy details and implementation status.

Pruess discussed examples of plan impacts, including Larimer County mattress recycling, infrastructure, and adoption efforts for electric vehicles and e-bikes, as well as available resources.

She emphasized prioritizing outcomes over actions and the importance of being able to measure them.

Mobility Case Study

Joyner presented a case study involving an individual over the age of sixty who uses an electric wheelchair and resides in Fort Collins. Some of his medical appointments require sedation due to severe PTSD, and he needs door-through-door transportation assistance because he cannot walk long distances. Although appropriate transportation resources were provided, he is unable to pay for services and was denied Medicaid. Joyner referred him to Disabled Resources and Foothills Gateway and later confirmed that he already has established case managers with both agencies. The individual continues to contact RideNoCo, seeking assistance that exceeds the call center's capacity. Koltz suggested contacting ARC of Larimer County for additional support. Mathis recommended developing and sharing a consolidated list of case managers, and Trujillo-Martinez agreed, adding that including the types of services provided would be beneficial. Further discussion included reaching out to UCHHealth to determine whether a case manager could assist with transportation support through Carepool.

Wrap-Up & Member Updates

Transfort & COLT Updates

Smith said COLT is currently trying to hire drivers.

Kelly said that Transfort has updated maps for the optimization plan on their website. There will be an open house at the Downtown Transit Center on June 11th, TBD, and printed materials should be available by the end of July or the beginning of August. Digital versions will be on the website.

LCMC Member Updates & Roundtable

Robinson shared that SAINT would conduct a pilot during the summer, driving between Loveland and Fort Collins based on rider requests and driver availability.

Vander Broek said that CSU is working on designs for bus shelters throughout campus, including nine platforms and shelters on the main campus this summer and up to ten more in the foothills.

Hull shared that the state announced a new NEMT broker for Medicaid that will be covering the entire state of Colorado. The switch will take place on August 1, 2026, from Transdev to Medi Drive.

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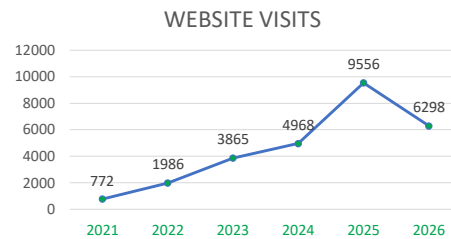
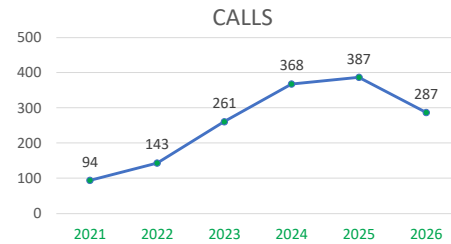

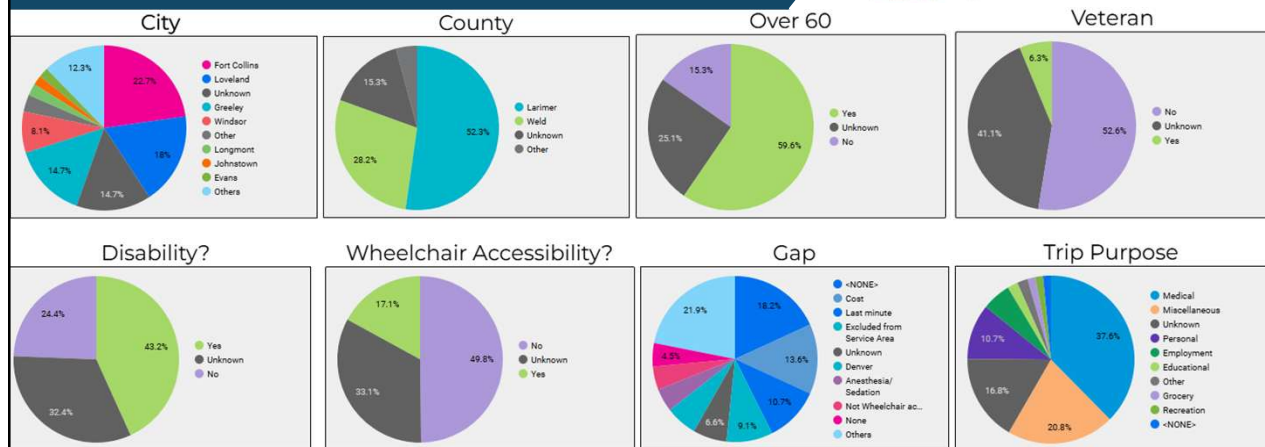


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Call Center Data – 2026 YTD

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A Little Help

Connecting neighbors to empower older adults to thrive in the homes and communities they love.



Who We Are



At A Little Help, we believe aging is a journey best supported through community. Our mission is to connect older adults with caring neighbors who offer occasional assistance and meaningful connection—empowering everyone to thrive in the homes and communities they love.

- 2005: Began as Washington Park Cares, when a group of neighbors in Denver came together to support older adults aging at home.
- 2007: Officially became a 501(c)(3) non-profit serving Denver Metro Area.
- 2017: Launched services in Fort Collins
- 2019: Expanded services in Berthoud and Loveland
- 2023: Launched services in Western Weld (Windsor, Severance, Johnstown, Milliken)
- Colorado-based non-profit headquartered in Denver
- 11 staff (including two in Northern Colorado)



Who We Serve

Older adults aged 60+ in most of Larimer County and portions of Weld County. (Fort Collins, Loveland, Berthoud, Windsor, Johnstown/Milliken)



567+ older adults (a.k.a. members) in Larimer County are eligible to receive services.

Transportation/Errands
Medical appointments, grocery stores, and more

Outdoor Help
Raking, hand trimming, patio set-up, gardening, weed pulling, snow shoveling.
No lawn mowing, tree trimming, or heavy outside work.

Indoor Help
Light indoor work like dusting, organizing, changing light bulbs, hanging pictures, and more.
No moving services, meal prep, or electric/plumbing work.

Friendly Visits/Pet walking
Walk and talk, read together, play games, just visit.

Tech Assistance
Computers, phones, social media, Smart TV's.

Not an on-call service.
Application and approval process required.



Eligibility/Process to receive services

Eligibility

- 60 or older
- Must live in service area
- Have a permanent place of residence (no hotels, shelters, etc.)
- Needs to align with our volunteer services
- Able to communicate independently by phone or email.
- No income eligibility required. (Majority are low-income)

Process to receive services

- Complete a membership application online or by calling the office to receive a mailable copy.
- Allow 5-7 days for initial review application by an intake specialist (includes review of the sex-offender registry)
- Follow-up call from intake specialist to verify application information, discuss needs and determine fit.
- Review of pay-what-you-can philosophy. *There is no payment required for services. Donations are welcome.*
- If there are no concerns with the application and conversation, then **Warm Welcome** is conducted.

Warm Welcome Conducted

- Specially trained volunteers conduct Warm Welcome visits
- Purpose: Get to know them better; review member handbook; ensure home is safe for volunteers (i.e., hoarding, aggressive animals, unsanitary conditions)
- If the volunteer has concerns from the visit, a follow-up visit from staff is conducted, and a determination is made on fit with A Little Help.

Approved

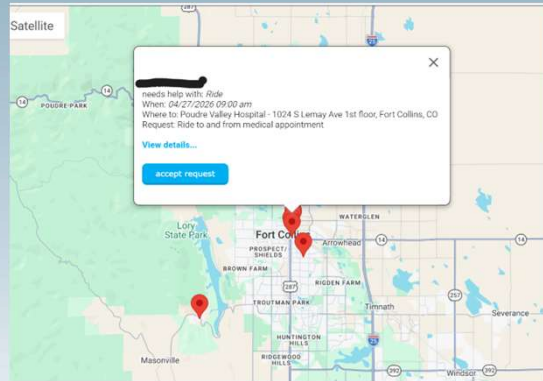
- Members can request services via phone, email, or text.
- Requests are posted on a secure volunteer portal accessed by background-checked volunteers only.
- Total processing time: 15-30 days (from application review to Warm Welcome)



How We Serve : Individual Volunteering

The core of our services are provided by compassionate volunteers throughout Northern Colorado.

- 18+ years
- Criminal background check required
- Flexible schedule (no minimum hours required)
- Teens under 18 can volunteer with a parent background check.
- Access to volunteer portal, HelpConnect, to accept requests.
- Volunteer coordinates service with older adult



Larimer County
500+ individual background-checked volunteers (~150 active volunteers)



How We Serve: Group Service Projects

Each year, more than 300 group volunteers gather to help older adults with yard clean-up and kindness kits in Larimer County.

- Available for groups of 3 or more (corporate, faith-based, school, families, civic)
- All ages are welcome
- Ditch the Desk program
 - Spring/Summer/Fall yard clean up
 - Kindness Kits
 - Group chooses the date and time for service project. A Little Help staff will match group with a home(s)
- Service Saturdays: Dedicated Saturdays in November for annual fall yard cleanup.

Our 2025 Impact:

Colorado

- 2950 older adults impacted
- 4612 total volunteers

- 500+ total volunteers (individual and group)
- 1700 direct services provided to older adults (4100 service hours)



2025 Member Survey Results

- 87% of older adults were able to interact more with others
- 72% of older adults felt increased access to emotional support
- 77% of older adults felt more socially connected
- 76% of older adults felt less lonely or isolated
- 96% of older adults were satisfied with their membership

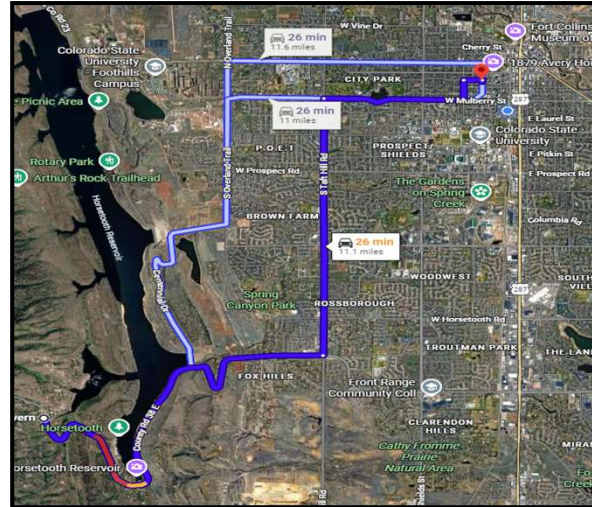

LCMC MOBILITY CASE STUDY



An individual who lives in the Horsetooth Reservoir area needs to get to a doctor's appointment in Loveland and needs help getting to Fort Collins for groceries and personal trips.

- The individual is over the age of 60
- The individual is disabled and uses a walker to get around
- There are no bus routes near them or from the Horsetooth Reservoir to Fort Collins.
 - The individual ends up using friends to get into town but does not want to be a burden.

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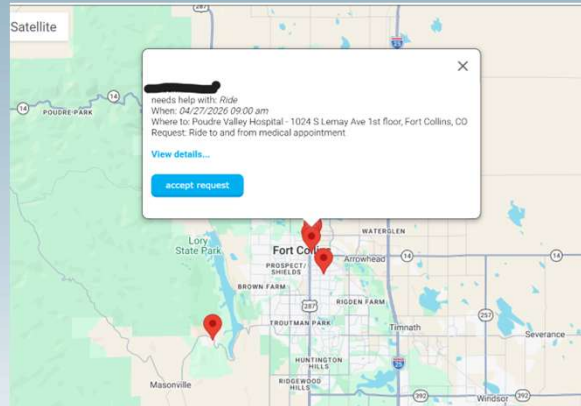
